ty two pounds sterling, then and in such case it is my Will and desire  
that she shall not be sold, but that she shall have her freedom, and  
the said sum of seventy two pounds shall be applied in the same  
manner and to the same purposes as if the said Nench had been sold.  
And secondly if any of the said Monies arising from the said sale, or  
any part of the said sum of seventy two pounds as aforesaid should  
remain after paying and satisfying the debts as aforesaid then I give  
and bequeath unto my Mother Mary Courtney the sum so remaining,  
together with all other property I may be possessed of, to her own  
proper use and behoof for ever. And lastly I nominate constitute and  
appoint Alexander Scott a free black Man of the City of Charleston  
Executor to this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all  
others by me heretofore made In Witness whereof I have hereunto set  
my hand and seal this 13 day of August in the Year of our Lord one  
Thousand seven hundred and Ninety nine and in the twenty fourth Year  
of American Independence.

Item I give unto my loving Wife Sarah Remington and my Son James Remington and to the survivor of them and their heirs for ever all my Negroes named Duncan, Will, Jamey, big Hannah, Silvia, little Hannah, Saffo, Jack, Ben, Walley, Sam, Lincey, Kate, Betty, Dina with their Increase and Issue. Item I give unto my Wife Sarah Remington and my Son James Remington and the survivor of them all my Plantations, in Goose Creek where I now live with all my Cattle, Horses, Hogs, Waggon, Poultry, Plantation Tools with all and every other part of my Estate real or Personal of whatsoever nature or kind the same may be to them and their heirs for ever provided nevertheless my said Wife shall have full power and authority to sell and any part of my Estate real or personal as she think fit for the payment of my debts and for the better maintenance of herself and my Son James Remington and I appoint my loving Wife Sarah Remington my Executrix of this my last Will.

putt' his arms, about half past, and assured me, when he took his leave for  
the night, that I might rest satisfied, that nothing serious would take place  
with me, at least for this Night, but since that I feel myself falling much,  
and am therefore uneasy that I shall not have the pleasure of seeing you  
again, and to mention some little arrangement that I beg you will make  
for me with respect to the few papers I have with me, my Servant, Trunks  
and Baggage a part of which is yet on board the Vessel that brought me,  
which the Servant will inform you of. My passage money 50 dollars is not  
yet paid, you will please pay it out of the Cash you will find in my B  
Trunks now here, I believe about 130 Dollars in 2 parcels. My Attornies at  
the Grand Caicas where I live is M<sup>r</sup>. John M<sup>r</sup>. Intosh, John Lorimer and  
John Harrison, who have the charge of my little affairs in that part of  
the world. M<sup>r</sup>. Harrison is the one that is my deputy as Coll<sup>r</sup>. of the  
Customs. to those Gentlemen you will please to send my Trunks and the  
Negro boy who is only borrowed from my brother in Law D<sup>r</sup>. Forbes who  
is a Planter on the same Island. the 2 bills of exchange in my favour  
for small sums you had better have forwarded and paid to you, so as to  
settle my little expences that I have incurred since my arrival. M<sup>r</sup>.  
Thomas Forbes you will please to remember is to act with my Attornies  
as an Administrator or Executor for my little in this world. God bless  
you Sir.

All the request of M<sup>r</sup>. Charles F. Taylor, at a time when he has reason  
to believe his disorder is getting worse and is anxious to have his affairs settled, I

form her off thro' his friend M<sup>r</sup>. Thomas Forbes, whose services he also requests  
The boatman and sailor Sapiro at present with M<sup>r</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>. Intosh is to be consi  
dered by his friends as the property of the customs lands and other property
