

WILL OF
PHILIP BREEN

17 R.^o The Will of Philip Breen of the City of Charleston
 No 14 South Carolina made on the 14th of August 1826.
 After my funeral expences and the payment of my Debts I
 desire the following disposition of my property to be made
 by my Executors John Wallace of Charleston Neck and Martin
 Roddy of the City of Charleston both Grocers. I desire
 that as soon as possible according to the best of their
 judgment my executors should have my real and other prop-
 erty sold & turned into money. In case of my father Henry
 Breen and my three Brothers and my Sister are living and
 that my Daughter Mary or Betsey Breen now aged about twelve
 or fourteen years and whom I left with my father when I
 left Ireland is also living I desire my property or its
 proceeds to be divided amongst them after making the de-
 ductions necessary for the payment of my debts expences
 and other bequests as follows Viz: To my father the sum
 of Four hundred Dollars, to each of my brothers and to
 my Sister the sum of Two hundred and fifty dollars and the
 residue to my said Daughter Mary Breen. I leave to the
 Right Rev.^d Doctor England/^{and} to Martin Roddy the sum of Five
 hundred dollars to be expended by them as they may see
 proper in the maintainance and education of Philip Breen
 now aged about nine months the son of Susan Peters of this
 City the said sum as also the education and care of the
 said Child to be exclusively under the direction of his
 Said guardians Bishop England and Martin Roddy otherwise
 they are at full liberty to dispose of the Said bequest
 and of any other portion of my property which may fall to
 the said child Philip, as if he was dead. And my Will is
 in case of the death of the said child that any part of my
 property willed to his use which may then be unexpended
 shall be given to the Roman Catholic Cathedral Church of

St Finbar of the City of Charleston with a request that my

soul may be remembered in the Masses and the prayers of the faithful. In case of the death of my father my will is that the shares to which he would be entitled should be given to my daughter Mary or Betsey Breen and that she should receive the portion upon attaining the age of eighteen years or when she should be married in a manner which my Executors may deem prudent, should she die before either of those periods I devise her share and all that may remain undisposed of by the death of any of my Brothers or Sister to be disposed of share and share alike amongst the Survivors of my brothers & Sister. This my will and testament I make and publish in my full and perfect State of mind though weak in bodily health.
