In the Name of God Amen, I Sarah
Williams, of the City of Charleston, and State aforesaid
said Widow of John Mortimer Williams deceased,
being weak in body but of sound mind and
memory, and calling unto mind, the mortality
of my body and knowing that it is appointed
for all Women once to die do make, declare and
publish this my last Will and Testament, in man-
ner and form following that is to say, principally
and first of all, I resign and recommend my soul
into the hands of God who gave it, and my body
to the earth to be buried in a decent Christian
manner at the discretion of my relations, not
doubting but ^{that} at the general resurrection I shall
receive the same again by the mighty power of

17 God my creator, and as to such Estate as it hath
pleased God to bless me with in this life after all
my just debts and funeral charges are fully
paid and satisfied, I give devise and bequeath in
manner and form following that is to say. I'm
primus I give and bequeath unto my Nephew
Stephen Elliott my Negro slave named Toby
and one of my horses. Item I do hereby give
and bequeath unto my Nephew William Elli-
ott twenty pounds sterling, and unto my
Nephew John Elliott twenty pounds sterling.
Item I give and bequeath unto Elizabeth Al-
lan the sum of fifty pounds sterling, and
unto c Martha Allan the sum of five pounds
sterling. Item I give and bequeath unto c Ma-
ry Parvis fifty pounds sterling. Item I give
and bequeath unto c Mary Bullock, and Eliza
Quimby the sum of twenty pounds sterling each.
Item I give and bequeath unto Arthur Honey-
wood my slave named Joe to be delivered to him
immediately after my decease, provided never-
theless and my mind, and desire is that in case
the said Arthur Honeywood should die under
age, or after he arrives of full age, that in either
case the said slave named Joe shall be and is
hereby declared entitled to his freedom. Item
I give and bequeath unto Elizabeth Ann Anderson
the younger twenty pounds sterling, and unto
my Nephew James Pritchard the like sum of
twenty pounds sterling, and my Will and de-
sire is that all the above mentioned legacies be
paid to the said legatees, or their Guardians, as
soon as can be after my decease. Item I give
and bequeath the sum of fifty pounds ster-

ling to the corporation of the City of Charleston
for the use and benefit of the Orphan house of
said City. Item I give and bequeath the like
sum of fifty pounds sterling to the corporation
of the City of Charleston for the use and benefit
of the poor house of same City. ^{Item} I do hereby give
and bequeath, unto my following slaves to wit
George, Sam, Rachel, York and Eliza their free-
dom for ever and do hereby declare the said
slave named George, Sam, Rachel, York and
Eliza intitled to their freedom immediately af-
ter my decease. Item I do hereby give devise and
bequeath unto my Sister Rebecca Mills, my
Niece Eliza Williams and my c Niece Eliza
Ann Anderson the Widow of William Ander-
son deceased, all the rest residue and remain-
der of my Estate consisting of a house and
lot at the corner of Charles and Pinckney
Streets, the following Negroes to wit c Betty
and her two Children, Beck and Jack and
three Children Hagar, Peggy, c Maryan
and Fortune and Isaac, my household and
kitchen furniture, riding Chaise, and a Ben
in Saint Philips Church, and M^r Pritch-
ards bond with interest, and every other spe-
cialty, and matter and thing whatsoever and
whosoever or of what nature or kind soever, to
be equally divided amongst them share and
share alike, provided always and it is hereby
declared to be my Will and desire, that in or

79. der that a fair and equitable division of the said
property should be effected, that my said house
and lot, and slaves named c Kelly, Beck, Jack, Ha-
gar, Peggy, c Maryann, Fortune and Isaac, hou-
hold and kitchen furniture, riding Chaise, and
my Pen in Saint Philips Church be sold after
my decease by my Executors herein after na-
med upon such terms, and conditions as they
may think proper, and that the monies aris-
ing from the sales thereof as well as from
debt due to me, shall be equally divided between
the said Rebecca c Mills, Eliza Williams, and
Eliza Ann Anderson the Widow of William
Anderson deceased (after discharging the res-
pective legacies herein before particularly
mentioned. Lastly I do hereby nominate, con-
stitute and appoint William c Mills Isham
Williams and John Geddes of the City of
Charleston Executors to this my last Will and
Testament hereby revoking all former, and
other Wills by me made and declaring this
only to be my last. In Witness whereof I have
hereunto set my hand and seal this the thir-
teenth day of December, in the Year of our Lord
one thousand eight hundred and in the twen-
ty fifth Year of the Independence of the United
States of America.

1800. This day the fifteenth of November one
thousand eight hundred at eleven o'clock before
noon, we Peter Laurans and John Baptist Mary
Delahogue residing at present in this town
repaired after having been called at a house si-
tuated in this City king street occupied by
c^{te} Jean Charles Joyeux being there and in a
room of the said house fronting king street
have found my said Sir Jean Charles Joyeux
being in his bed his body very sick, but his
mind, memory, judgment and understanding
very sound, he has said to us that knowing
how much certain is death and fearing to be
surprised by it before he has put his temporal
affairs in order and considering that the State
of weakness to which he is reduced by the ma-
lady and consequently deprived of the faculty
of redacting and writing with his own hands
his last Will he requests and intreats us to
write his intentions which he himself has dic-
tated to us without the suggestion or induction
of any body they are the following. does
declare my said Sir Jean Charles Joyeux
that he is charged with the affairs of c^{te} Jean
Lahogue now absent in virtue of his letters of
attorney dated the twenty of nivos year the sixth
signed and signed by c^{tes} Messieurs Duprat and Troupon
Notaries at Bordeaux duly authentic that by the said
