As to the worldly goods with which it has pleased God to endow me, I dispose of them in the following manner. Imprimis, it is my will that my funeral charges and just debts be discharged as soon as possible after my decease. Item I give and bequeath to my son Samuel McCorkell one negro man named Dick, a carpenter by trade. Item I give and bequeath to my son John McCorkell one negro wench named Chloë, with her female child named Sally, with their future Issue, also six silver table spoons, six silver tea spoons, one silver paper spoon, one silver strainer, together with all my working tools of every kind. Item I bequeath to my said sons Samuel and John the residue of the lease of the land and buildings on which I at present reside, and all my outstanding debts.

I understand the same to be the same person as the one who was born in the Town of Port-au-Prince in the Province of Cap-Haïtien on the 14th of July, one thousand seven hundred and thirty five, out of
legal marriage between Marie Françoise Richard deceased at Port-
au-Prince in the Year one thousand seven hundred and sixty nine,
and Paul Bellemont de la Rivière deceased at the Môle St. Pierre
in St. Marc's Parish on the Island of St. Domingo in June,
one thousand seven hundred eighty four, myself late planter at
the place called les grands Cahos St. Hieronime's Parish of the
petite riviere district of St. Marc on said Island, where I arrived
the twenty third of June one thousand seven hundred and
forty seven, and where I resided until the thirty first Decem-
ber one thousand seven hundred and ninety two when in
order to avoid being murdered by the assassins armed by the
Civil Commissioners Perverel and Bonthonax against all the
planters of the said Island of St. Domingo, I shipped myself
by furloon from the Municipality of St. Marc recorded in
that of the petite riviere my parish for North America where I
arrived in this City of Charleston, the 1st February one thou-
sand seven hundred ninety three, on the brig Governor Pink-
ney Captain Dardillier. Being far advanced in years and
threatened to loose my eye sight, I have thought fit to anticipate
on that event by writing the present my Testament and
ordinance of my last Will as follows. Born and having al-
ways lived in the Roman Catholic faith, I request of my
Executor hereafter named after my decease to have my body
interred where ever he pleases in the humblest manner and
with the least and at the smallest expence possible. I confirm
by the present if it were necessary the freedom which I have
given by an act to that purpose by me subscribed and before
witnesses, the said act duly recorded in this City to my negro
man named Jacques, born free in the said City, but who
by the events of war, was taken prisoner and carried to
Martinico where he was sold and from thence brought to
St. Domingue where I bought him. And the freedom also given
by me by another act under my signature in presence of
witnesses and duly recorded to my negro woman Marie Noel
born in St. Domingue. I give and bequeath unto M^r. Vincent
le Signeur Doctor of Physick and living in this City the
principal and my share of the profits in the copartnership
contracted betwixt him, my brother and me, each concerned
for one third the fifteenth of July, one thousand ninety five
acknowledging by the present that I have received beyond the
amount of my said share either by monies advanced by
le Signeur to my brother and me, for our livelihood
keep us in cloaths ever since the same was
