At a Doctor Killpatrick's will (Vide Bundle A. D. 1747). In the Name
of God Amen. I David Killpatrick of Berkley County in the Province of
South Carolina being sick and weak of body but of sound and
disposing

disposing mind and memory thanks be to God for the same do make this my
last will and testament in manner following that is to say first and
principally I bequeath my soul to God that gave it and my body to the Earth
to be buried in such Christianlike manner as to my Ex^rs hereinafter
named shall seem fit and as to what worldly estate I shall please
God to bless me with I give devise and bequeath the same in manner
and form following vizt I give I will that all my just debts
and also my funeral charges be paid and some other things for my decess.
Then my will is that my Ex^rs hereinafter named down some short
time after my decess make sale and dispose of my plantations which
lyes at Hambaker in order for payment of my debts. Then Whereas
am possessed also certain plantation out tract of thirty three acres and
also of a tract of fifty five acres of land which I hold by lease from
the William Gibbs for the term of thirty years which is to terminate
and come on Michaelmas in Berkley County aforesaid now my will
is that my Ex^rs hereinafter named do permit to John Perry my
present coxner to continue on the same for the space of one whole
year from the term of my decess and to have the use of all
servants the slaves and white servants I shall die possessed of. Then
he said John Perry regarding to my said Ex^rs a full and just acct of
the profits arising from the same and my will is that thereout
one third part to the said John Perry the sum of one hundred pounds
be paid to the said John Perry and the sum of one hundred pounds for the
burning of three score thousand of bricks and building two stables
of brickwork mending two houses and bricking the well and
taming the two horses aforesaid and plaistering & whitewashing
the same and also to permit all the cattle belonging to the said
John Perry to graze upon the said tracts and also that the said
John Perry have likewise provisions for himself and his family
during the said term out of the profits of the same and also
all the end of the said term to have ten bushels of corn and ten
bushels of peas. Then my will is that after the expiration of the
term of one year aforesaid my said Ex^rs do sell my four
slaves vizt John, Prince, Peggy Kate, and also sell all my
right to the plantation aforesaid which I hold by lease of the
said lease and that the moneys arising by such sales after
my debts being paid as aforesaid be equally divided between my
loving friends John Perry and Joseph Heap share and share
alike. Then I do hereby nominate constitute and appoint
Sam^l Colclough Esq and Anthony Mathews Merch^t Ex^rs of this
my last will is also the sum of one guinea each to buy them
mourning rings. Then I give & bequeath unto my loving friend
Killpatrick the sum of one shilling and lastly I hereby revoke
annul and make void all former and other wills and codicils
by me heretofore made declaring this only to be my last will.
In witness whereof I have set my hand to the first part and my seal

and being on Neithor Creek in Berkeley County aforesaid now my will
is that my Exrs hereinafter named do permit John Perry my
present overseer to continue on the same for the space of one whole
year from the time of my decease and to have the use of all
servants the slaves and white servants I shall be possessed of. Then
he said John Perry regarding to my said Exrs a full and just acct of
the profits arising from the same and my will is that thereout
my Exrs pay to the said John Perry the sum of one hundred pounds
for his part of the crop and the sum of one hundred pounds for the
burning of three score thousand of bricks and building two stacks
of chimneys underpinning two houses and bricking one well and
raising the two houses aforesaid and plaistering & whitewashing
the same and also to permit all the cattle belonging to the said
John Perry to graze upon the said tracts, and also that the said
John Perry have likewise provisions for himself and his family
during the said term out of the profits of the same, and also
at the end of the said term to have ten bushels of corn and ten
bushels of peas. Then My will is that after the expiration of the
term of one year as aforesaid my said Exrs do sell my four
slaves vizt Peter, Pinus, Peggy White, and also sell all my
right to the plantation aforesaid which I hold by virtue of the
said lease and that the moneys arising by such sales after
my debts being paid, as aforesaid, be equally divided between my
loving friends John Perry and Joseph Heap share and share
alike. Then I do hereby nominate constitute and appoint
Sam^l Goodleigh Esq and Anthony Mathews Merchant Exrs of this
my last will as also the sum of one guinea each to buy them
mourning rings. Then I give & bequeath unto my son James
Tillpatrick the sum of one shilling and lastly I hereby revoke
annull and make void all former and other wills and codicils
by me heretofore made declaring this only to be my last will.
