desire and implore Mr Benjamin Hodder of Charlestoun in this  
Province. Notoriant to receive and witness to her all such wages &c &  
other effects and chattels belonging to me & first paying thence  
what money sum indebted in this Province. In witness whereof  
I have hereunto set my hand this the fifth day of August 1736.

Ann Stanwyk equally to be divided amongst them after my debts and funeral  
charges be duly paid. Also my will & pleasure is that upon John Brown my  
sheffler of age 21 the year of twenty two years my daughter Elizabeth & Ann Stanwyk  
shefflers of age 18 the year of eighteen on the day of marriage and in case any  
of my aforesaid children should depart this life before they arrive or attain  
the ages aforesaid their share or part aforesaid shall be  
equally divided between the surviving children aforesaid, & again my  
will and pleasure is that when my wife shall depart this life a money that  
then that share of land that comesther is before bequeathed shall revert  
and pertain to my surviving children to be equally divided amongst them  
as aforesaid. And lastly I appoint and desire my beloved friend Mr  
Brown of Berkley County Planter to my whole sole executors of this  
my last will and testament. Since the aforesaid John Brown  
should depart this life before the debts and necessary matters are  
adjusted & discharged that he the said Brown may then nominate  
another as he shall think fit.
