I Nicholas Ridgell of Charleston married being sick in body but of sound mind and memory do make this my last will & testament. And first it is my will and desire that all my just debts be fully paid and satisfied. All the rest and residue of my estate befalls whatsoever I give devise and bequeath to my dear loving wife Sarah Ridgell living in Christ Church in the Highgate Lane. I give house, I hereby declare and empower all Benjamin Redden of Charleston in this Province Merchants to receive and receipt for all such wages, debts or other effects now owing or belonging to me by fresh paying thereof what money I am indebted in this Province. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this fifth day of August 1720. Signed sealed published and declared by the said Nicholas Ridgell in presence of ^{himself} James Brown (B) his last will and testament in the presence of the said testator.

Presently appeared before me Henry Turpin, James Brown, Testator's witnesses, who then subscribed their names to the within will, who being duly sworn on the Holy Evangelists declare they were present and did see James Brown the testator sign, seal, publish and declare the above and within testament and see the within witness Nicholas Brown, James Brown and his wife declare the within instruments to be his last will & testament, what he said at the time of executing the same appeared to us persons present and understanding to the best of these deponents' inquiries, and these deponents say that they are lawfully sworn to their names as witnesses in the presence of the said testator but as requested.

KK No 23 The last will & testament of James Lowmyer Bundle N. N. No 23. In the Name of God Amen. I James Lowmyer of Berkeley County in South Carolina Planter being sick and weak of body but of sound mind and memory thanks be to God for the same, do make this my last will and testament in manner & form following vizt. And first I give my Body to the earth from whence it came to be buried in such decency as my friends shall think fitt. My immortal Soul to God that gave it in hopes of a blessed resurrection through the merits of a blessed Redeemer Jesus Christ the Righteous. I give and bequeath my real and personal Estate unto my well beloved wife Elizabeth Lowmyer and my three children John Lowmyer, Elizabeth Lowmyer Junr & Ann

Ann Lowmyer equally to be divided amongst them after my debts and funeral charges shall be paid. Also my well pleased is that my soul to be buried in the chancel of the church of the year of my death. My daughter Elizabeth Lowmyer shall be of age at the year of fifteen on the day of marriage and necessary of my said child should depart this life before she arrive at the age of fifteen (the age of the said child) that then there or part aforesaid shall be equally divided between the surviving children aforesaid, to give my will and pleasure is that when my wife shall depart this life in any that then that share of land that cometh hers before bequeathed shall come and be divided to my surviving children to be equally divided amongst them as aforesaid. And lastly I appoint and desire my beloved friend John Brown of Berkeley County Planter to have my whole & sole executor of this my last will and testament to have the aforesaid John Brown should depart this life before the debts and necessary matters are adjusted & discharged that he the said Brown may then nominate one other who shall think fitt.
