At Montreal 25 June 1789

The last will & Testament of John Colwell deceased being now exhibited in
order to be proved by the witnesses before his Honour to have been being
entered by Robt Blodget on the behalf of the relations of the said dead:
the several subscribing witnesses being sworn deposed as follows:-
Richard Lambton maketh oath that on Saturday the 1st June instant
the defendant went to Mr Bridges plantation to pay a visit to Mr John
Colwell who was then sick, but then in his perfect sense. That Mr
Colwell then told the defendant he was desirous to make a will,
but that he would defer to the next morning when he expected
the Judith Stevens would come out of her duty. That on Sunday
morning Mr Young came to town to the defendant's house he
came from Mr Colwell who desired he would come to him &
make his will. & accordingly the defendant went to him about
eleven of the clock in the forenoon & found him to the best of his
knowledge in his right sense. That Mr Colwell gave the
defendant direction to draw his will accordingly, the defendant
did draw the will now produced as it now appears & the
defendant & witness did sign the afternoon at four o'clock
that he named the Doctor judge whether he would be sensible to
execute it. That the defendant read it over to him till Colwell
approv'd it. Then the defendant asked him if it was drawn according
to his mind. Mr Colwell replied yes. The defendant then
asked Mrs. Young if she would sign it. She intirely answered she was very
weak but willing to execute it. She got up in his bed state on the side
of his bed chamber. He then signed sealed & delivered the instrument
now produced & sent to my master as a record & deed for the uses therein
mentioned in the memory of all the subscribing witnesses &
then the said will was enclosed in a box sealed with the same
seal the testator then delivered to Mr Young one of the executors
named. The defendant saith that he being informed that the Testa-
tator a few days before had been eight headed it was upon that dict.
that reason the defendant waited till Sunday in the afternoon
before he gave it him to execute. The defendant saith the several Lega-
cies given in the will were entirely dictated to the defendant by the
testator & that no other person whatsoever gave any directions therein.
Lastly the defendant saith that he the defendant legied his name
as a witness to the said will together with the other witnesses in
the testator's presence.

William Rockay another subscribing witness deposes that
on Sunday the 1st instant about four of the clock in the afternoon
one Cooper came to the house of one James Kearne where the defendant
then was told Mr Kearne that his master Mr Colwell was very
ill & desired Mr Kearne would go to him. whereupon the defendant
went along with him to town to Mr Colwell found him in his
room that he was then in his senses and the defendant heard Mr
Colwell
