

Ino Godby Goodby

So Carolina & In the Name of God Amew! the eighteenth day  
of October in the year of our Lord 1750. I John Goodby Senior of the Parish  
of St. James Hove Creek in Berkley County Planter being poy sick & weak in  
body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given to God therefore calling me  
to mind the mortaliy of my body and knowing that this is appointed for all men  
once to die & make & ordain this my last will and testament that is to  
say principally and first of all I recommend my soul into the hands of God  
and give it & as for my body I recommend it to the Earth to be buried in a  
Christian like manner all the discretion giving Executors nothing doubting  
but at the time of resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty  
power of God and as touching such worldly estate whereof it hath pleased God  
to blesse me in this life I give & dispose of the same in the following  
manner and forme. I command you and bequeath to my loving wife  
Elizabeth <sup>both</sup> negro named Harry and one man two Indians named Henry  
and Pege. Also I give and bequeath to my two sons Eliz. all my horses and  
nest Cattle of all sorts and I leave all my household goods & all sorts belonging  
to the plantation & her and her heirs forever. Also I give and bequeath to my  
son John a negro man named Harry unnumbered pounds next money  
of this Province. Also I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary a negro boy  
named Harry unnumbered pounds next money of this  
Province and one hundred acres land all situated in my son Josephs  
name son Josephs being now in his possession to him and his heirs  
forever. Also I give and bequeath to my son Alexander my plantation I now  
possess containing two hundred and ten acres of land the houses and built  
uppon thereon standing to him and his heirs forever. Also I give and bequeath  
to my said son Alexander & one hundred acres land next to his to him and  
his heirs forever. Also I give and bequeath to my grandsons son Eliz. and  
one negro boy named Pege. Son Pege man a Indian wife & two children and lot  
and two Indians named Natt and Hobin. Also I give and bequeath to  
my daughter Mary a negro girl named Nancy. Also I give and bequeath  
unto my soninlaw Henry Cooper twenty shillings Carolina money. Also  
I give and bequeath unto my grandson John Cooper a negro boy named  
Deamme and one hundred pounds ~~Carolina~~ money to be paid when he is  
twelve years old and laid out in Schooling for him. Also I give to three  
Rock Church ten pounds to be paid in view to the Church warden of the  
said Parish. And I do hereby nominate and appoint my loving  
wife Elizabeth & Alexander my son sole and whole Executors of this  
my last will and testament & hereby revoking all former wills by me made  
hereinwhereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this day and  
year first above written.

Will: Kirk - John Baugy -

South Carolina Personally appeared before me this 31<sup>st</sup> of October 1750  
and made wrote & subscribed the body Evangelist of Almighty God that it was the Will of  
Mr. John Goodby deceased that his son James Goodby should have to himself  
one Indian girl by name Nancy Brown to be his wife witness of the same  
will by name John Baugy Will & Keasey and the day above written.  
Sworn this day above written before me.

Memo: That on this thirtyninth day of Octo: 1750 personally came and appeared before me  
the witness named Will: Kirk John Baugy and Lewis Barnes who being duly sworn  
on the body Evangelist say that they and each of them saw plainly print  
and did see the Wm testator John Goodby sett his mark and seal put ther  
and declare this writing to be his last will & testam: and that Amy Montague  
present at the same time and did set her mark as a witness and that the said  
testator was of sound disposing mind & memory at the same time.

No 5 In the Name of God Amew. I Samuel Turner of the Province of South  
Carolina being sick and weak of body but of sound and perfect memory thanks be  
to Almighty God and calling to remembrance the uncertain state of this transient  
life and that all flesh must yield unto death do make constitute ordain  
and declare this my last will and testament in manner and form following  
recording and attesting by this present all and every testament and testaments  
will and Wills heretofore by me made and delivered either by word or writing  
and the same taken only for my last will and testament and no other and  
first recommending my soul unto Almighty God my Savio and Redeemer by the  
merits of whom I believe assuredly to be saved & to have full remission of all  
my sins and my Body to be buried in such place and in such decent manner  
as shall seem best to my Executors hereafter named. And now for the settling of  
my temporall estate which hath pleased God after goodness to bestow upon me a  
Older give and dispose the same in manner following. I Sampson. I will set  
my funeral charges and all those debts and dues which I owe in right of  
Conscience to any manner of person or persons whatsoever herein called  
Speed fully accounted & paid by my Executors hereafter named. Also I give  
and bequeath unto my son Thomas overyngthon name bello boy and  
one gun and one cuttah box and one Cuttah and the first maccall  
that shall be folded from one of the maces wch I give to my son Sampson or  
my son Benjamin her and her income to him the said Thom: Turner his  
heirs & assignees forever. Also I give and bequeath to my son Sampson  
One Cuttah box and one Cuttah and one more named Pege leather  
box
