Item. Whereas of late I have been ill & unable to attend to my business  
very much & am but of common understanding now therefore do make this my last  
will & testament but I recommend my love & regards of all my friends  
hoping through yr mercies to see me here again in health & strength so all my sons &  
everlasting love my long time & dear wife & my dear son of my Executor & Executrix to my worldly estate I give & bequeath unto my son William Bayley of Town lot 10 in  
Charlestow which was formerly Capt. John Bayley's old house & great house  
stands of late lived in legally with yr fine house & all other buildings & yr  
P. Town lot 10 also half of a parcel of land near Cornhill corner containing  
fifty acres thereabouts w<sup>t</sup>捕获屋 with my son Capt. Charles Basden  
I have & to hold yr P. Town lot 10 buildings & premises above belonging to yr  
parcel of land to my son William Bayley his heirs & assigns forever. Item I  
give grant demise & bequeath unto my son William Bayley one other town lot  
in Charlestow which formerly belonged to yr son Capt. John Bayley & wherein Capt.  
John Glavell now lives together with yr house & buildings therein, I have had  
yr P. Town lot & premises to my son William Bayley during his natural life &  
after his decease I give grant & bequeath yr P. Town lot & premises to my two daughters  
Mary Basden Miller & Susanna Rawlins their heirs & assigns forever to be divided  
equally between them. Item. I give grant demise & bequeath unto my daughter  
Mary Basden Miller One moiety or half part of my town lot in Charlestow  
fronting on Wharf whereon I now live, vizt that moiety or half part of yr P. Town

town lot next to Capt. Rhett where Mr. Buckley lately lived. I have & hold & have  
half town lot to my daughter Mary Basden her heirs & assigns forever. Item. I give  
grant demise & bequeath unto my daughter Susanna Rawlins y<sup>r</sup> moiety or half  
part of my said town lot fronting ye Wharf, vizt yr P. Town lot & half town lot  
lot & ye house wherein I now live, I have & hold & have half town lot w<sup>t</sup> y<sup>r</sup> building  
thereon to my daughter Susanna Rawlins her heirs & assigns forever. Item. My  
will is of my three town lots situate near yo Market Place in Charlestow as  
divided into three equal parts as followeth of front to go Broad street after Capt. John  
y<sup>r</sup> front to yr little street & run by Dr. Franklin & Mr. Remond to be divided into  
threes of P. plots to be divided by straight lines running northward & southward, vizt  
thrid part of my P. Town lots w<sup>t</sup> y<sup>r</sup> westernmost. I give grant & bequeath to my  
son William Bayley during his natural life & after his decease I give grant & bequeath  
y<sup>r</sup> thrid part of P. Town lots to my two daughters Mary Basden & Susanna Raw-  
lins their heirs & assigns forever to be equally divided between them. That third part  
of my P. Town lots w<sup>t</sup> y<sup>r</sup> Easternmost next my son Paul's land, I give grant  
& bequeath to my daughter Susanna Rawlins her heirs & assigns forever  
and y<sup>r</sup> thrid part of P. Town lots w<sup>t</sup> y<sup>r</sup> lies between other two threes of P. Town  
Town lots. I give grant & bequeath to my daughter Mary Basden her  
heirs & assigns forever. Item. I hereby appoint authority & empower my Executor  
& Executrix hereinbefore named or any two of them to sell & dispose of yr half town lots  
& unipurchased of the Henry Sommey & sons to y<sup>r</sup> south end of yr two town lots  
of yr formerly Capt. Blapp's to any person or persons & will purchase of same & pay  
thereof by yr late friend Capt. Bayley to pay my debts. Item. I give unto my  
daughter Mary Basden Susanna Rawlins all & singular my household goods  
to be equally divided betw<sup>t</sup> them. Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Mary  
Sister my Indian girl Slave named Virginia. Item. I do give & bequeath  
with my son William & daughter Mary & Susanna all & singular my ship goods  
with my real or personal estate not already bequeathed in this will to be equally divided  
betw<sup>t</sup> them y<sup>r</sup> they paying my just debts share & share alike. Lastly I do  
appoint my son William Bayley my two daughters Mary Basden & Susanna  
between my Executor & Executrix of this my last will & testament to hereby making  
null & void all former to the wills hereunto set by me made & declared  
in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal at Charlestow  
the twenty eighth day of August 1893.

South Carolina Edward Rawlins

In the Name of God Amen I — day of December in the year of  
Our Lord 1799 Edward Rawlins of Lawerston in the Province of South Carolina  
being sick & weak of body but of sound & full mind & memory thankes to the  
Almighty God for his to make this my last will & Testament in manner & form following  
(that is to say) first I recommend my soul to Almighty God my maker &  
believing of it shall receive full pardon & the mission of hell instant & he saved by  
the precious death & merits of my blessed Saviour Jesus Christ. Item I give to my  
wife Susanna Rawlins all my estate now & hereafter to have & to hold in her  
thereafter named Estate think well & convenient that as I have no son or daughter  
as yet in which case I have my wife Susanna & my daughters there to be employed  
& bestowed as hereafter by her my wife to use & to have in common with her  
late & wife and all in the same to manage & to care for her during her stay to be my  
last will & Testament. Item in that it shall be my will & desire in right  
or consequence being married to Susanna Rawlins before my death to my wife  
or contained therein within my marriage bed & all in case by my said  
hereafter named. Item I give to my wife Susanna Rawlins all my estate now &  
hereafter named Estate with all my chattels & tenements in & during her natural  
life giving & quieting unto my wife Susanna Rawlins full power & authority to  
sell or dispose of y<sup>e</sup> same as she shall see necessary for the maintenance & bringing  
up of my children my wife is y<sup>e</sup> person next Susanna shall be so left after my death  
y<sup>e</sup> part of part of my estate & estate belonging to me at y<sup>e</sup> time of death of me & wife shall be  
equally divided betwixt my children & living & if shall please God to y<sup>e</sup> any one or more  
of my children shall die or depart before they shall come to age in which case  
y<sup>e</sup> part of her or she so departed as aforesaid Estate be divided amongst y<sup>e</sup> rest  
living & if shall please God y<sup>e</sup> all my children & their whols lawfull dependents  
of whom shall come to age my will & meaning of y<sup>e</sup> parts where fore I declare & ordaine  
to be equally divided betwixt y<sup>e</sup> children of James Rawlins & William Gayley both  
or their heirs to their proper use & behoove for ever. Item in that Susanna my wife  
desire my loving wife Susanna aforesaid to be Execut<sup>r</sup> of this my last will & Testament & I  
desire her to have care of my children & for safety of them among y<sup>e</sup> wife Susanna  
ordain & desire my loving friends Robt. Daniel & Mr. James Stewart & Capt.  
John Howe overseers of them jointly or severally to be Executors of this my last will  
& Testament & have care & charge of y<sup>e</sup> part of my Estate aforesaid as shall be  
left by my wife at her decease & for use of my children as aforesaid giving  
unto my Execut<sup>r</sup> or either of them full power & lawful authority by their  
present to sell or dispose of any part of my Estate left by my wife at  
her decease as they shall think needfull for y<sup>e</sup> bringing up of my children.  
In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand seal this 24<sup>th</sup> of September

John Grimball

In the Name of God Amen I John Grimball of Edisto Island  
in Colleton County Esq<sup>r</sup> being old & sick & weak but of sound mind and memory  
thank God to y<sup>e</sup> Lord to make my last will & Testament. Imp<sup>r</sup>. I give unto  
my dear & loving wife Mary Grimball my plantation on Edisto Island containing  
one hundred acres of land bee the same more or less with all the houses  
buildings & improvements thereon belonging during her natural life. Item. After  
my wife's decease I give grant & devise unto my son Thomas Grimball all my  
plantation of sixteen hundred acres apiece with the buildings theron. I have also  
sold my 2<sup>d</sup> plantation & buildings therow to my 2<sup>d</sup> son Thomas Grimball his  
heirs & assignees forever. Item. My will is y<sup>e</sup> my son Thomas Grimball in  
consideration of the aforesaid plantation & buildings shall pay within one  
year after my wife's death the following sumes vizt to my daughter  
Hamilton ten pounds sterl. To my daughter Lucy ten pounds sterl. and to  
my daughter Providence ten pounds sterl. Item. I give grant & devise  
unto my son Christopher Linkey & his wife Ann their heirs & assignees  
beginning all y<sup>e</sup> four hundred acres of land which I purchased with my P<sup>d</sup> son  
in partnership from y<sup>e</sup> Lord pp<sup>r</sup> 2<sup>d</sup> q<sup>r</sup> whole being eight hundred acres bee  
paying in consideration thereof to my son John Grimball the sume of  
ten pounds within one year after my death. Item. I give & bequeath  
unto my dear & loving wife all my rings plates jewels with her  
choice of my featherbeds one bolster two pillows two pair of sheets  
a blanket curtains counterpane or rugg & also one large girl's bed  
Giving & likewise one full third part of all singular the remainder of  
my personal estate of what kind & nature whatsoever. Item. My will  
is y<sup>e</sup> my wife shall have to her self besides the foregoing legacy to y<sup>e</sup> value of  
fifty pounds which she hath made of several things of y<sup>e</sup> same kind y<sup>e</sup>  
of y<sup>e</sup> which shall not be accountable for the same. Item. I do
