Carrollina. In the Name of God Amen, this twelfth day of September 1891 I Richard Butler of the Province aforesaid being weak of body but in perfect strength of memory thanks be given to God waiting to record the weakness of my body knowing that it is appointed for all men to die do make & declare this my last will and testament in manner & form following that is to say. First and principally I give my soul into the hands of God who gave it me & for my body I commend it to the earth to be buried in Christian & decent manner in such place as my said Executors hereafter named shall think best without any meddling doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God touching such worldly estate as hereafter it shall please God to show me in things I give devise bequeath & dispose the same in manner & form following.

First I will devise y^e all those debts & duties that are in conscience & justice being due to persons as now be well & truly satisfied & to be paid in some convenient time after my decease by my Executors hereafter named. I also give & devise to my grandson Richard Richman one negro girl by name Fanny to be sold over to him after my decease. I also give bequeath to my granddaughter Mary Richman one young negro woman to be delivered to her when she does the age of six years.

I also give bequeath to my son John Butler one mare & colt & all the produce of the stock & plantation at that date of my decease & all the goods & chattels in my lifetime till he comes to enjoy all at the death of my wife Anne Butler. I also give bequeath all my whole Estate both real & personal to be managed in the power hands & possession of my friend Anne Butler during her life whom I can & lawfully appoint by this my last will & testament my whole & sole Executor & after her decease the said Estate both real & personal to be in the hands possession & occupation of my eldest son John Butler & his lawfull heirs forever for want of such better heirs the said Estate to be sold & remain in y^e hands possession of my daughter Mary Richman & her heirs forever. I will & desire that Anne Butler & her heirs may be paid and my wife Anne Cicely Butler & John Butler appointed in this my last will & testament. I do will & ordain likewise my dear wife Hannah Barker my full & sole heiress & Executrix of this my last will & testament. my desire is that my good friend Capt. Richard Holloway be assistant to my said Executrix & for his trouble therein my will is y^t my said Executrix pay out of my estate to him the sum of five pounds - willing my said Executrix to see my debts be paid.
