myself wife and children to be delived to my said children when they  
come to age to day when Frances & Phillip Jones are one & twenty years  
top female children and of age of fifteen years or are married before  
they happen that either my wife or children espouse their life before they  
come of age or are married that then my said Estate be delived

between the survivors equally & that my estate remaine the residue of personal
