 Province to be paid her on the first day of March commencing from the day of my  
 death during her widowhood and in all other cases she may stand the aforementioned  
 shall be answered by my Son during her natural life. Item I give and  
 bequeath unto my Sons aforementioned all interest of my estate real and personal  
 like equally divided share and share alike to them and their heirs and Assignees  
 forever they equity allowing for the Rearing of the youngest child as there  
 mother shall think fit. Item my will is that if either of them should die  
 after marriage or duration to make his<sup>n</sup> Auction wherein he will come to the usage  
 of eighteens then shall the same to be equally divided among the rest of my sons  
 And in case either of them should have undispissable to their mother that then  
 she the said Elizabeth Turner shall sell them off as she shall think fit.

 Stock o<sup>f</sup> cattle horses mares sheep hogs and all and singular the above bequeathed three hundred  
 Seventy two acres of land and all and singular the appurtenances thereto  
 belonging in every way whatsoever pertaining. I bequeath unto my aforementioned loving  
 wife Mary Seabrook for her and her proper use benefit and profit  
 inheritance and discharge of and from the payment of all and all manner  
 of debts due and to be due to her according as the same was formerly  
 due me given unto my aforementioned loving wife and her heirs and Assignees from

female negroes Name a mulatto girl, Tobagan Indian boy and Lucy and In-  
dian female, three hundred leuenty and two acres of land and plantation on  
Hadinalaw Island lately purchased of my brother in law May Arthur Bell  
with my stock of cattle horses mares sheep and hoggs therow and onethalf  
of all my stock of cattle horses mares sheep hoggs that are upon my  
Island Commonly known by the name of Seabrook's Island together with all  
singular my household goods and furniture tools and utensils of what  
nature or kind soever with all my ready cash whether gold or silver  
or wrought plate which said negro & Indian slaves w[ill] be above bequeathed  
Stock of cattle horses mares sheep hoggs and all and every of their future  
respective increase and all and singular therabove bequeathed three hundred  
leuenty two acres of land and all and singular the appurtenances thereto  
belonging in every way pertaining I bequeath unto my aforesaid loving  
wife Mary Seabrook for her and her heirs and assigns and freely and clearly acquited  
severally and discharged of and from the payment of all and all manner  
of debts due and demands whatsoever according as the same was formerly  
by me given unto my aforesaid loving wife and her heirs and assigns forever  
by the name of Mary Seabrook in all and every the before mentioned bequeathed  
particulars by a Deed of gift bearing date the eighth day of August and at the  
year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred & twenty w[th] said Deed of gift  
in all the parts thereof according to the express tenor and words therein contained  
and in every sentence Paragraph and line thereof I hereby declare firm and  
effectual both in common Law and Equity to my aforesaid loving wife Mary  
Seabrook and her heirs and assigns forever. Secondly I bequeath unto my  
aforesaid loving wife Mary Seabrook liberty during her widowhood to  
reside at my Island as formerly and thereto enjoy all the priviledges I have un-  
seized of it and to the said Island commonly known by the name of Seabrook's  
Island w[th]out any impeachment of or for any manner of waste of any person  
or persons whatsoever during the time of her widowhood aforesaid. Thirdly  
I will and bequeath unto my loving brother Joseph Seabrook and his heirs  
and assigns forever all my Island Commonly known by the name of Seabrook  
Island (excepting and forever obsering) and regarding the aforesaid debt  
for my aforesaid wife during her widowhood and the aforesaid half of all  
of horses mares cattle sheep and hoggs therow that are properly mine then

with Old slaves and Peter negroes Catherine Willis and Flora Indians and  
Leave a master boy to him the said Robert Seabrook and his heirs and assigns  
forever with all the respective future increase of the aforesaid bequeathed slaves  
and stock as well as the aforesaid bequeathed Island in all the parts thereof at  
all and singular the appurtenances thereto belonging or in any ways appertain-  
ing. Always provided that my aforesaid loving brother Joseph Seabrook  
his heirs executors or administrators shall and do well and truly pay & cause to  
be paid unto all my respective Creditors all and every sum and sume debt  
and debts legacies and bequests herein given as well as all my funeral char-  
ges &c without any trouble vexation or demand to be made by any person or  
persons whatsoever of any of my debts which some or many legacies that are or  
shall be given by this my last will and testam't of my aforesaid loving  
wife Mary Seabrook and that he furnish or cause to be furnished for my said  
loving wife Mary Seabrook in all respects convenientate the new house now  
beginning Weddellaw Island on the land and plantation bequeathed to my  
aforesaid loving wife Mary Seabrook under her hands and signed forever.  
And further in case my aforesaid brother Joseph Seabrook & shall refuse  
or neglect to pay all undebting my lawfull debts and legacies that are or  
shall be given by this my last will and testam't then and in such case and  
for such cause I will and bequeath unto my aforesaid loving wife  
Mary Seabrook and her heirs and assigns forever all and singular my  
Island, slaves stock and whatsoever else is herein bequeathed unto my brother said  
Seabrook unto my aforesaid loving wife Mary Seabrook and her heirs and  
Assigns forever upon provy that she shall and do well and truly pay unto  
all my Creditors all my lawfull debts and pay my funeral charges and well  
truly pay unto my sister Ann Parrott or her heirs too Indian Slaves back and Roll  
which I hereby bequeath to her and her heirs forever and also to my son John  
Parrott fifty pounds curr<sup>t</sup> money at the day of marriage w<sup>t</sup> thereby  
bequeath to her and her heirs forever. Now I give and bequeath unto my  
loving brother Joseph Seabrook all my warring apparel. And fifty  
Sheely rounce make word and of new effort all other wills and test-  
aments by me herte for made and written therin neither to be my last will and  
testament. Sixthly I will and bequeath unto my master fellow Thompson his  
freedom immediately after my decease. And my will is that the two Indian  
Slaves bequeathed to my sister Ann Parrott be delivered to her immediately  
after my decease. Lastly I will and appoint my loving brother Joseph  
Seabrook and the Hon<sup>r</sup> Mr<sup>r</sup> Landgrave Joseph Norton to be and sole execu-  
tors of this my last will and testam't writing them to delive unto  
my brother in law <sup>Alleged</sup> John Seabrook all appurtenances & cattle of my Island & all work  
bequeath him by my deceased father Cap<sup>r</sup> Robert Seabrook and  
also to suffer all those who have any stock upon my full thar by my  
permission to take them off. I witness whereof I have hereunto set
