one English Shilling and the same to be paid unto each hereafter by my Executrix
And lastly my will is that my son Isaac Rescant (after my decease)
shall take into his own possession my whole estate for every thing aforesaid
mentioned to be in manner & proper right forever and I do hereby utterly
desire no man to have & to enjoy the former testam^t & wills legacy
bequests & tenements by me in my will before this time named will &
bequeathed setting & confirming the same to be my last will & testament

written.

At Christiana Oct 21st 1792. Having approached before witnesses

no other testam^t or will before me and then & there to say they subscribe

No 47. The last will & testament of Roger Whitley Senior R.R. 1792
On the 21st day of God January I Roger Whitley Esquire
belonging to General Francis Tickelton's Independent Company at
Fort King George South Carolina being weak in body but of sound
judicij mind memory pleased be God for the same to make &
declare this my last will & testament in the manner & form following
(that is to say) First and principally I recommend my soul into the
hands of Almighty God my creator & Redeemer trusting & relying
thereon shall receive full pardon of & remission of all my sins though
the alone merits of Jesus Christ my blessed Saviour & Redeemer
as far as my body & soul is concerned it to the Earth for decently interred at the direction
of my Commanding Officer Lieutenant James Watt. And as for my temporal
estate

estate goods cattle & debts which now is or at any time hereafter shall be
anywhere due owing payable to me at the time of my decease with my
Spanish account & any other money that has been & is owing account
by Mr. John Portman after my Office sales all my substance and
ancreas due in this Company now in the hands of King Will Esq^r &
what sumes that has been paid by the said King Will Esq^r upon my
account without propositus is not to be allowed & shall my effect
here in the Fort & at Mr. Portman's in Charles Town over his daughters hands
In primis I do give devise the same unto Mr. Alexander Hobart
in manner & form following until his satisfy for all the Bills of
Exchange drawn by me on King Will Esq^r Esq^r as also what money
he has laid out for me since my last only with this reserve that Lieut.
James Watt is to be fully satisfied by the goods that shall be left in his
hands for the full sume of fifty thousand pounds thirteen shillings currency
which has been laid out in manner following. Among noted drawnoworth
Hobart for fifty one pounds five shillings & six pence currency back
debt of twelve pounds seven shillings six pence which compleateth the
sume of fifty three pounds thirteen shillings & six pence that happens that the aforesaid
King Will Esq^r has paid the aforesaid Bills drawnoworth by me to his friends
Mr. Hobart & Mr. Watt that has been bequeathed to him & is to be satisfied
for such sumes as he has distributed from me since my last till the oversell
of my Spanish account my arrears & balance due in this Company
with the remainder of my effects is to be appropriated to the paying of my
debts which owe to the Company to their expence of my funeral
This being my last will & testament hereby revoking all former wills
by me made. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand
and seal this seventh day of October Anno Domini 1792

see the testator Roger Whitley sign & seal publickly declare the above
