James La Rock

In the Name of God Amen the fourteenth day of December in the year of our
Lord one thousand seven hundred and sixteen I James La Rock of Harris Town
in the Province of South Carolina being sick unto death in body both infirm &
perfect mind and memory of thence to this my testamentary bed in the said Town
knowing the uncertainty of this mortal life in Earth and to make remiss to
settle things in order etc in case of sudden death am to do my last will & testam.
in manner following in writing & in case of these presentes or any
other will failing to attain in said Testament in writing by me made & executed
elsewhere by word or writing in the aforesaid Town to my last will & testam. now
here and most especially before witness my son John La Rock my brother
hoping through the mercies and mediation of my Lord and Saviour Jesus
Christ to receive a full pardon in all my sins and sins unto the Earth to be
buried therein in due & decent manner and my executors hereafter named
shall be charged & required for the settling up temporal estate & such a part
shall be used & disposed of towards it as you see fit in respect to Boston given
me p[er]petual order upon and respect of the sum in Summ from time henceforth
is to say First I will that all my debts and dues item right or otherwise
done by manner of person or persons whatsoever shall be well and truly satisfied
settled and paid & accounted him after my decease by my Executors hereafter
named. Item I give and bequeath one Negro man by name Jeff and one negro
woman by name Sue and her increase unto my serving wife Christian La Rock.
Item I give and bequeath unto my son James La Rock the sum of one shilling and
money of the Kingdom of Great Britain. Item I give and bequeath unto my son
John La Rock all my cattle though that are in the Province of South Carolina.
Item I give & bequeath my two Town lots in Charlestown alias said known distinctly
in the record of the said Town by the number of (195) and (278) wherein I now lie
together with all and every the appurtenance unto them belonging & likewise all
my other personal Estate (not hereinbefore herein described) of what nature
kind or quality soever the same may be unto my daughter Mary La Rock and
to her heirs & assigns forever and that all the aforesaid premised by me bequeath-
ed to her be delivered into her possession ^{as soon as she shall arrive} and as soon as she shall arrive
to the age of sixteen years or on the day of her marriage which shall first happen
but if she should die before her marriage or before she arrive at the age of sixteen
years or about having any issue of her body lawfully begotten let then hereby
quit and with the said premises unto my son John James and he agreed to
be equally divided between them. Lastly I do hereby nominate constitute and
appoint my will before named Mr William Elliott of Beaufort County Master to have
as an executor wife Christian La Rock during his life only & then he shall be
my widow to be my Executor jointly & separately of this my last will and testament
testimony whereof I the said James La Rock have hereunto set my hand seal
the day & year first above written.

B. B. In the Name of God Amen I Andrew Foster of South Carolina Marcht^t
No 10 being in good health & perfect memory praised be my Almighty God
to make & ordain this my present last will & testament in manner & form following
(that is to say) first & principally I commend my soul into the hands
of Almighty God my Heavenly Father hoping this the merits death & pas-
sion of my blessed Saviour Christ Jesus to have full and free pardon & forgive-
ne my faults my sins & to inherit everlasting life my body committed to the
Earth to be decently interred at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named
and as touching the disposition of all such temporal estate as I shall please
Almighty God to bestow upon me I give & discharge thereof as follows to wit
Imprimis I will require that all my debts & funeral expenses shall be just
paid & discharged. Item I will bequeath unto my friend Mr. Christopher
One gold ring to the value twenty five shillings Sterling. Item I give &
bequeath unto my friend Mr. David Durkens One gold ring to the value
twenty five shillings Sterling. Item I give & bequeath unto my friend
Mr. John Gough One gold ring to the value of twenty five shillings Sterling.
Item I give & bequeath unto my dear Housing mother in law Mrs
Arthur one negro woman named Sally w^t all her increase during the
said Arthur's lifetime & then to my daughter Ann Foster. Item I give &
bequeath unto the said Ann Foster one Indian girl & one mulatto girl &
my dwelling house w^t I desire may be lett white or age or marriage
Item I give & bequeath unto my brother Christopher Arthur one negro
boy named Michael. Item I give & bequeath unto my Cz^t Joseph Axson
one Indian boy named Dickie. Item I give & bequeath unto the sum of
hundreds of pounds and money. Item I give & bequeath unto
Molloney the sum of fifty pounds and in case my daughter Anna
