Memorandum. The twenty fifth day of June 1792. I Thomas Smith
of Carolina being of perfect memory & understanding do make and ordain
to be my last will & testament in manner & forme following. I give & bequeath unto my Sonne George Smith his choice of one of my houses either young or
old which he liked best with my second best middle and biddle. I give & bequeath unto my Sonne George all my weareing apparell as well linnen as woolen bedd
stuffs too. I doe also give unto my sonne George Smith all my brick houses in
Charleston in cont. four rooms one above another with convenient passage
leading from it to him and harknes and assignes forever. I give & bequeath unto my sonne
George all my instruments that belongs to Chirurgery and one half of all my
medicines and one half of all my books of what nature or kind soever as also one
written book two pair sheets two blankets one rugg two pillowes and one bolster
also one large brass morter & pestle Also one silver posser two silver spoons
one small silver tankard two small silver salts six knifes and six calvers.
and twenty pound current money of Carolina to be paid unto my said sonne
George within three months after my decease by my Executor hereafter named as
a set howe leather chaires and one cedar table board and thirtie shillings
settled in little sum. I give & bequeath unto my grandauncle
Thomas Smith my case silver tankard to be nevertheless used by my sonne
George during his life repaireed by him. I give unto my faithfull
mane Scott Joseph Blake for a remembrance of me my silou tobacco box.
Finally I give & bequeath all the rest of my goods real and psonal chattels,
what so ever to my sonne George Smith his heires & assignes forever, whom also
I name the sole Executore of this my last will & testament excepting what
is a遗 to my sonne George whose legacie herein specified it is my meaning
that he and unto Scott Joseph Blake by my Executor and sonne Thomas Smith
unto the last living said sonne George within four months after my decease
disposseably pay and request the said Scott Joseph Blake to be the overseer
of my sonne George till he shall be twenty one years
old. Testes my hand & seal the 25 day of June 1792.

Memorandum. The 21st day of November 1792. Thereof orally appeared before me the
Capt. Joseph Blake Capt. David grane & Governor and Mr. Peter Green
witness their oaths did declare that they were personally present and did
swear, see and hence the within written Recd. by Thomas Smith Esq. & sign seal
the 25th day of June 1792 publish & declare the within written to be his last will & testament and at
the closing thereof he was of perfect sound minde and memory to the best
of their knowledge and at the same time the above witnessmen Ranney
was present and a witness to the said will.
