Item the rest and residue of my personal Estate whether it consists in Slaves or debts or any other way to be at her own free will and device to my said wife Mary and my daughter Magdalen to have and to hold to them and their heirs forever to be equally divided between them both at the discretion of my said wife over when my said daughter Magdalen shall marry. It is likewise my will that my said wife Mary shall have the possession of my real and personal Estate for the space of two years and she to pay all my just debts and so forth in my last will and Testament. I do hereby make and appoint the aforesaid Mary my wife John Maggot my eldest son & my good friend Mr Richard Stevens Executors. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the aforesaid second day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and sixty five.
