Brittain and after her arrival there to deliver her unto John King Esq  
sole Owner thereof unto his assigns that he also deliver her loading  
to such persons as the same is consigned to by bills of lading signed  
by me And I do hereby inpower the said Thomas Dolman to do the  
do what things relating to the said Snow before then the said  
as he shall think may be much expedient for the interest of the

The last will and testament of William Tutton Bundle L.L. 1777  
In the name of God Amen. I William Tutton of Charleston  
in the Province of South Carolina Vicariller being well of body and  
of sound and perfect mind and memory thanks be to Almighty God  
for the same but considering the uncertainty of this transitory life  
doe make ordain and declare this to be my last will and testament  
and first and principally I commend my soul to Almighty God my Creator

and my body I comitt to the Earth to be buried in such Christian burial  
among Quakers hereinafter named as shall think fitt and according  
my worldly Estate which it hath pleased God to bestow upon me  
that like same shall be disposed of in manner as hereinafter by this my  
will is declared and sett forth. Inprimis I do hereby order that  
all my just debts as also my funerall expenses be paid in some short  
time after my decease. Item I give devise and bequeath unto my  
wellbeloved wife Mary Tutton all my estate as well real as personal  
within the Province or elsewhere to hold the same unto my said wife during  
her heirs Executors administrators and assigns to the only use  
 behoofe of my said wife Mary her heirs Executors Administrators and  
assigns forever. Item I do hereby nominate constitute constitute  
my said loving wife Mary Robert White of Orluerton in the  
County of Southwilt with the Kingdom of Great Britain Bechoes and Executors  
of this my last will and testament And lastly I do hereby make  
and make null void all and all manner of former and other wills  
and codicills by me heretofore made declaring this only to be and  
contain my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have  
to this my last will testament sett my hand and seal the thirtieth  
day of September in the thirtieth year of the Reign of our Sovereign  
Lord George by the Grace of God of Great Brittain France and Ireland  
King Defender of the faith &c And in the year of our Lord one  
thousand seven hundred and twenty six.
