And it is my will that if my Daughter Margaret Arden should happen to die before she comes to the age of Twenty one years, that then the one full moiety or half part of my Estate herein given to her shall go to my loving Wife Mary Arden her heirs and assigns forever. Lastly, I do make and ordain my said loving Wife Mary Arden to be Executrix of this my last Will and Testament, requiring my Executrix to see the same performed and to take the best care she can of my Daughter, to bring her up, and I utterly revoke all former Wills & Testaments by me heretofore made and declared, In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this Twentieth day of July in the year of our Lord one Thousand Seven hundred & Twenty Two.

Memorandum / On this 25th day of October 1724, Personally came and appeared before me M^r. Thomas Waring, M^r. John Stubbley and M^r. Joseph Arden, three of the Witnesses to the within written will, who being duly sworn on the holy Evangelists of Almighty God declared that they were personally present and saw the within Testator Edward Arden, Sign, Seal, Publish and Declare the within Instrument

Majestie's Reign. Fr. Nicholson.

The Oath of an Executor. You Swear that you believe this to be the last Will and Testament of the deceased E. O. and that you will perform the same by paying all the debts and expences of the said deceased, so far as the gooder will & husband Law shall bind you. That you will cause all the said goods to be appraised, and make a true and perfect Inventory of the s^d goods, and likewise a true and just account of the same, when you shall be thereto lawfully called. So help you God.

Pursuant to the within Ordinance or Power directed an s^t behalf, I did on the Eighth day of October 1722, at the Conde Plantation, administer the within Oath of an Executor unto y^e within named Mary Arden upon the Holy Evangelists, in the same words as are within mentioned, according to due Form and according to the within writ of Ordinance or Precept. In Testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand the said Eighth day of October Anno Dom: 1722, and in the Ninth year of His Maj^{ty} Reign.
