July in the Year of our Lord, One of our said Lord hundred and Thirtieth  
Three at Charles City in the Province aforesaid before me in Person the said  
Will and the Command of William Bowen late of Berkeley County in the said  
Province, the Party whom it is to these presents annexed, my power,  
approve and allowance of. the said decedent having whilst he lived and at the  
time of his death done and wrought his rights and credits within the Province aforesaid  
By and by virtue of the said power and allowance of his Testament, and the  
power of granting the said execution of all and singular things in, right  
order, due and lawfully due also the settling the accounts, and settling  
particulars of the said Administration, and the final discharge and dis-  
charge of all and singular things in, right and order of the said decedent, and the  
discharge and allowance of me concerning was expressed unto the said John  
William and Thomas Benjamin Esqrs. named Executors in the said William  
Bowen's last will born on the holy Evangelist mat and feast day is and  
in the same, and make a full and perfect Inventory of all and singular  
things, rights and credits of the said decedent and to exhibit the same to the  
Court of Charles City at or before the Nineteenth Day of Novem-  
ber next ensuing, and to render true and lawful account, collection and redem-  
ption of the same require. In testimony whereof I have signed  
my hand and seal the Nineteenth Day of November 1733.

Barnstable Mass. July 25th 1772, whereby his Personal Estate  
was and belongs to the above said Anne Fairchild and her Heirs and  
Widow and Anne Fairchild his Children fully pursuant to their Petition  
in that case made & granted. That the said Anne Fairchild the Mother  
by her Will Dat: the 17th Day of February Anno Dom: 1772 gave & bequeathed

All her third part of the personal Estate of her said husband Richard  
 husband which then remained undivided, as also whatever she should  
 receive of either in this Province or elsewhere unto her Daughter  
 and her Children for ever, and of her Will approved Your Honour  
 as well as Guardians of her said Daughter Anne till her arrival  
 to the age of Eighteen or day of Marriage, and Your Honours having  
 proved the said Will and taken upon you the worthy and Execution  
 thereof. All of Your Honour Thomas Churchil hath been duly  
 appointed Guardian of the said William Churchil.

That Your Honours are desired to signify to the said Richard  
 that he is not to receive any money or appurtenances of the Personal Estate of the said  
 Anne Churchil till he, and the Personal Estate of the said Richard deceased  
 be divided, as usual in such cases, according to Law.

Wherefore Your Honours humbly pray Your Excellency  
 Ordinance of this Province that the said Estate of the said Richard  
 Churchil may be divided, and that the said Anne Churchil be paid  
 the same, as usual in such cases, according to Law.
