Imprimis I will that my just debts and funeral expences be paid

and discharged out of the growth & produce of my Plantation

with all convenient speed after my decease

Item I do give unto my Negro woman Judy her full liberty and

freedom to be enjoyed for ever after the expiration of One Year

from my decease & doe hereby pronounce and declare her free &

that she shall not on any pretence whatever be taken, be taken,

reputed or deemed as any part of my Estate, but from all services

thereto be utterly acquitted and discharged

Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved and loving Wife Annaronia

Gibbes and my deare daughter Elizabeth Gibbes all the rest and

residue of my Estate both real & personall of what nature or

kind soever to be equally divided between them share and share

alike when my said Daughter shall arrive to the age of sixteen

years or be married which shall first happen to have and to

hold to each a moiety thereof to them and thure respective heirs

for ever and untill my said Daughter arrives to the age of sixteen

years or be married I will and require (after my debts & funerall
