In the Name of God Amen, I Pray.
 Family of the Lord, I do hereby testify that we make
 this my last Will and Testament in manner following
 I give unto my dear beloved Wife, I give
 of all my house hold to her wife, and one third of all my personal
 Estate to her and her heirs for ever.

Then I gave unto my son Lewis the two houses that my dear
 Father, Mary & I with the land belonging to the new house in town
 first in Charles Towne, together with all the land of Lewis & William
 Nash in Kingman River being part of William Buff and four hundred
 acres of land and Edward Swamps he now lives on. And the one fifth
 of all my estate as slaves, horses, cattle, household goods &c. to him & his heirs for
 ever. Then I gave unto my son Samuel Lewis my house & land on the front
 of Charles Towne with a fourth of Lewis & Thomas Smith & son Lewis Smith
 & one thousand acres of land called Chapman one fourth of which is Lewis
 & Maria's share & five hundred acres of fine land joining on the back of my
 mill pond & the one fifth of all my estate as to him & his heirs for ever.

Then I give unto my son Anthony, Twelvy that English part of the land which
was the Bluffs in Charles River, Three hundred Acres called Newbury &
two hundred Acres land called Spunkbury in Massachusetts, in this town.
And so five hundred acres of more land, lying in Western County in John
Praguel land, to one fifth of all my Estate to be given to his he loves for ever.

Then I gave unto my daughter, and her husband, one hundred Acres of Land, call'd
Land given to two hundred Acres of Land, call'd the first purchase in the Purchase of
Lake Tawar, in Ninigun and seventy two Acres of Land between Ninigun &
Dart, I am now bound to one fifth of all my Estate to be to her and her heirs
for ever. Then I gave unto my daughter, and her husband, one hundred Acres of Land

Acres of Land was Temporal Lord's property & 100 Acres for settlement in
 Wigan, & one hundred Acres of Land was given to a church called Wyke, & one
 hundred Acres of Land in Cheshire called near Renschook & 1/2. Each about
 5 miles more or one fifth of all my personal Estate to her and her heirs for
 ever, & the 1/2 to Elizabeth to her & her heirs for ever

My meaning is that my Wife shall have the use of the house during her life so far that of all my personal Estate, I will give what she please, in the name of my personal Estate, to my son William to be equally divided amongst them by either child, yet without any part that be devised to the Survivor.
