Robert Hyatt's last Will and Testament (made 1723) Robert Hyatt his last Will.

In y. name of God. Amen. I, Robert Hyatt of Colleton County, South Carolina, being of perfect mind and memory, thank be to God for it yet knowing the uncertainty of this life, that it is appointed for all men once to die, do hereby in my last will and Testament, I do hereby principally and first recommend my soul to God, and give it to him, the most great Father, Son and Holy Spirit, to have accept at the Throne of God and my body to the same to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner according to the direction of our Brethren hereafter named, nothing doubting but I shall receive the same at the general Resurrection, and as to these worldly goods and estate which God hath pleased God to bless me with, I give and bequeath them in manner following. I give and bequeath unto my most beloved wife Mary Hyatt one, Hundred Acres of land situate lying and being in Colleton County, South Carolina, bounding on the lands of Mr. Charles Oding, as appears to one plot & Grant for 160 Acres bearing date 1711 with make appear. I give and bequeath unto my only son, Joseph Hyatt all the remaining part of my land, that is to say over and above the hundred acres before named as reference to one plot and grant for 160 acres bearing date 1711, for and the place and grant before mentioned for 160 acres bearing date 1711, will make appear. I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Mary Hyatt the half of all moveable pertaining or belonging unto me, with her being and maintenance on my Plantation, during her middle age after my decease. I give and bequeath the other half of all moveable pertaining or belonging unto me unto my only son Joseph Hyatt. I give my Will is that I desire to not be divided till after my debts be paid. I give my Will is that my only son Joseph Hyatt have a full and quiet possession of my land, and that he be not troubled with any suits of law, but in consideration that if my son Joseph Hyatt should die unmarried

Before the arrival of 21 years of age in such case & consideration, I give  
 my Wife Mary Hyatt, all my Lands or Lands as the true plots & grants be-  
 coming, with all my other goods, in such case & consideration as is above  
 mentioned I give unto my Cousin Edward Hyatt one hundred Pounds current  
 money of the Province to be paid in the term of two years after the decease of  
 my Cousin Joseph Hyatt. I give likewise in such case and consideration, I give  
 unto my Cousin Sarah H. the sum of Fifty Pounds current money of the  
 Province to be paid within the term of three years after the decease of my  
 Cousin Joseph Hyatt. In such case & consideration as is above mentioned, I give  
 to my Wife Mary Hyatt all the remaining part of my Estate  
 both real and personal and portion of the full sum of fifty pounds beforemen-  
 tioned but in consideration that she is not yet of age, I give unto my Wife Mary Hyatt  
 one hundred of money one year of age having no child born, nor unborn in  
 such case my Will is that my said bequest to my Son Joseph be equally  
 divided between my Wife Mary Hyatt & the Wife or Wives of my Son Joseph  
 I am but in such case & consideration as is last mentioned my Will is that the  
 said bequest to my Wife Mary Hyatt be not given or paid unto them. I am therefore constituted  
 Executor and Administrator of this my last Will, finally I revoke and annul  
 all other Wills whatsoever acknowledging this to be the last in which I have
