I William Livingston late of Charles City near of Hobbys River being
 indisposed of body, but of perfect & sound mind, thanks be to God, do
 make & constitute this my last Will & Testament hereby revoking all
 former Wills by me made. I do commend my immortal soul to God my
 Father, in & thro' y. merits & intercession of his Son Jesus Christ my Lord
 & Redeemer to whom I hope to live for ever, after the resurrection of this
 body is. I do desire may be interred in Charles City or as both executors
 at may be by my late Wife then or. I do appoint not out of any disre-
 spect to my present Wife, but for y. sake of a pecuniary promise
 after all my just debts are paid I give, devise and bequeath unto my
 Eldest Son William half of y. Tract of Land contained in three Plots
 or. I bought of John Kennaway near Potomac River making 1006
 Acres and he may have his choice of y. Assigning to him & his heirs for
 ever. y. other moiety I give to my second Son Henry & his heirs for ever.
 II I give, devise & bequeath all that part of the four thousand Acres of
 Land I bought of Col. Daniel, & or. I did not part with to my first Wife
 making, together with my part of what I sold her, two thousand two
 hundred & fifty Acres, to be equally divided between my beloved Wife, Hannah,
 to my son William, Henry, & daughter Margaret (only my son William

 VI My beloved Wife may live upon the Plantation (where she now dwells)
 during her Widowhood, but upon her marrying (to which I sincerely
 advise her) I order the Plantation to be sold by my Executors hereafter
 named, who hereby have full power for that purpose, or when my son
 William shall come to the age of Twenty Years, which shall first happen.
 What things and Jewels I have given to my beloved Wife, to be disposed of
 amongst my Children at her discretion. & All my Personal Estate I give
 to my beloved Wife Hannah & my five Children to be equally divided amongst
 them, and the management of it I leave to the direction of my Executors.

Until it is divided amongst them & if any Approve to give with any of my Sons, it is my Will that the money be deemed as part of their share of the Personal Estate. My Childrens I leave to the care of my beloved Wife, George Smith Esq^r, to Joseph Moody of Charles City Neck, to whom I leave the care of executing this my last Will, to each of whom I leave a mourning ring. (Memento mori &c) before the signing of this my last Will, in the last time save first and in the last of these are our savings out.
