In the name of God Amen April y: 25 day 1724, I Mary Hyatt of Colleton County South Carolina y: Wife of Robert Hyatt deceased being of perfect mind & memory thanks be to God for it, yet knowing the uncertainty of this life to that it is appointed for all Men once to die & to examine this my last Will and Testament that is my principally and last I Recommend my soul to to God that gave it me hoping by y: merits and intercession of Jesus Christ to have access at the throne of grace and my body to the earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner according to the direction of my Executors hereafter named nothing doubting but I shall receive the same again at the general Resurrection as to those worldly goods and Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me I give and bequeath them in following manner.
Imprimas I give to my son Joseph one hundred Acres of Land left me by my husband's Will it on three things and a gooder bushel and a pare of three Shuchels. Imprimas I give fifty pounds y: mantaining of an apt Minister. Imprimas I give all the rest to my son Joseph I desire of my son, Joseph die under age without a child without a child born or on born I give to John Jenkins four hundred pounds.
Imprimas If my son Joseph die under age and have no child born or on born I give to my father Joseph y: hundred Acres of Land left me by my husband and all the moveables and he shall give my son about fifty pounds. Imprimas I give to my son about all my wearing apparill. Item I therein constitute and appoint Mr Joseph Seely Junr and Mr John Jenkins to be Executors of this Will and sealed in y: presence.
