The last Will and Testament of Francis Holmes Senr
 South Carolina Recorded 18 June 1726

This is the last Will & Testament
 of me Francis Holmes Senr now residing in Charles-
 Town in the Province of South Carolina —
 Forasmuch as I find my self through many
 weakneses & Sickneses drawing to the End of this
 transitory Life, yet still through Gods great Goodness
 having the free Use of my Understanding and a perfect
 mind and Memory, I have thought fitt to make
 this my last Will, for the setting my House in Order
 But first I commend I commit my Spirit, with Trust
 and hope of heavenly Felicity into the Hands of Jesus
 my glorified Redeemer, and Intercessor, and by
 his mediation into the Hands of God my reconciled
 Father the infinite Eternal Spirit Light, Life
 and Love of whom and to whom are all things —

My alone Benefactor, whose Janry, and whom
I desire to serve, and to whom be Glory for ever,
praying to humbled for all my Imperfections, and
hoping in the alone mercies of Jesus Christ that
He will by his Spirit renew me, send me as his
own, and to moderate and blest to me my Long
Sufferings in the Flesh, not having one Day Free
from Pain these Twenty Years, and as to such
wordly Substance as it hath pleased God in his
Goodness to Bestow upon me, I Give and dispose
of as followeth. Imprimis I will that
all my Just Debts be paid off and Discharged
by my Executors and Bequeath unto my Exors
