Plantation in London with houses and all that belongs to it in any
manner of way whatsoever together with thirty Negroes which she
may choose out of all that belongs to me except those hereafter men-
tioned which plantation and Negroes I give to her the said Janet,
McQueen and her heirs for ever.

Item. Give unto my naturall son John McQueen all my Interest in the
lands of Thomas Smith and Company according to Articles of
Agreement between my self the said Thomas Smith and James Fraser,
likewise one Negroe boy now at Savannah Town named Fels together
with my half of Hoggs Heads and Hares about Savannah Town the
Other Belonging to Thomas Smith.

Item. Give unto my Loving Cousin Elizabeth McQueen Daughter to = =
Alexander McQueen One Hundred pounds Currency and one Negroe
girl now at Edisto.

Item. Give unto my sister in Law Elizabeth Read One Negroe girl.

Item. Give unto my Mother in Law Jane Read One Negroe girl.

Item. I bequeath unto my Cousin James McQueen my half of the House and
workes at Savannah Town after the expiration of three years till which
time they remain for the Benefit of Thomas Smith and Company.

Item. my Negroe Cooper, Sumbow and Hector about Negroe I have sold to Tho.
Smith and own my self fully satisfied for them.

Item. after all my Debts and Funerall Charges are discharged I leave the remain-
der of my Estate to my Loving Wife Janet McQueen and her heirs for ever
appointed my Loving Friend Thomas Smith and George Sommers Esqrs
to this my last Will and Testament to the full filling of which I bind my
self my heirs Executors administrators and assigns As Witnesses my
hand this twelfth day of February One thousand seven hundred &
thirty six, given in presence of us signed sealed and Delivered.
