

The Twentieth Day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety five. And in the twentieth year of the Independency. I John McMullon of South Carolina and County of Fairfield. being very sick and weak in Body, but of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given unto God for the Same, and calling to mind the mortality of my Body, and knowing, that it is appointed once for all men to die, do make and ordain, this my last Will and Testament; that is to say, principally, and first of all, I Give and recommend my soul into the hands of God that give all; and for my Body I recommend it to the Earth to be Buried in a Christian like and Decent manner at the Discretion of my Executors, nothing Doubting but at the Generall Resurrection, I shall receive the same again by the mighty Power of God; and as touching such wordly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to blis me in this life I give, Devise and bequeath unto my Wife Mary and form following, that is to say ~~in the first place I constitute~~ ^{in the first place I constitute} and appoint Mary my wife as Executor Together with John McEwen Junr and John Harvey They are to Collect and Refray all Debts or accounts whatsoever that may of their own knowledge know to be just Next I leave my Land containing fifty acres more or less to my beloved Wife Mary to her own proper use so that she shall peaceably enjoy the same. Excepting that a -- Child which Mary my wife is supposed to be with should live and come to the years of Maturity that child when of age shall enjoy this my Land above mentioned; but- Mary my Wife never the less shall have her lifetime of 3^d Land and if the supposed Child should die before the -- age of twenty one then it shall refer to Mary my Wife and her Heirs forever. I Further leave to my Wife Mary one mare together with two cows and two calves: and two plows one of them a big plow the other ~~the other a shovel~~ with all the Rest of my plantation

Tolls I also leave her all the Household furniture Bed
and clothing of every kind Except one pair of Black velvet
Breeches which I leave to John Harvey Jun^r and one white
Broad Cloth Coat to John Harvey Jun.^r And I also do
utterly difallow revoke and disannull all and every other
former. Testaments, Wills Legacies bequefts and Executors.
by me in any ways before this time named- Willed, and
bequeathed, ratifying and confirming this, and no other
to be my last will and Testament. IN WITNEFS WHEREAS
