

In the name of God Amen, I Duncan McGill of the State of South Carolina and Marlborough County, being well in health & perfect memory blefssed be God for the Same; yet calling to mind the frailty of my body and the uncertain time of my death, do make and ordain this my last will & Testament, in manner and form following, that is to say I bequeath my body to the earth to be buried in a decent Christian manner next I bequeath my Soul to Almighty God not doubting but he will mercifully receive the same, and as to such worldly estate as he has been pleased to bestow upon me, I dispose thereof in the following manner. - - - - -

First. I lend and bequeath unto my beloved wife, Katherine during her natural life the plantation whereon I now live, together with all the land belonging to it & after her decease to devolve on my son Duncan & his heirs

Next I give and bequeath unto my said wife Katherine & her heirs one half of all moveable stock and also the whole of my household furniture including cloaths & c, my lawful debts I desire may be paid out of my remaining half of my stock &c. Also the charges of my funeral. the residue if an therebe I desire may be divided between my daughter Christian and my grandson John McDonald. I next ordain my trusty and well beloved friends James McQueen Esquire of Robeson County North Carolina and my beloved Son Duncan McGill Sole Executors of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking & annulling all former wills by me made, & declaring this to be my last Will & Testament this 7th day of August 1798.

I further bequeath to my beloved daughter Nancy McIntyre the Sum of two Shillings Sterling and a like Sum to my daughter Peggy McGill. I further declare this codicil to be part of my last will & testament.
