the best he can with it as long as he shall live or until my
youngest child comes of age. I do not want my negroes sold unless
there should be a great change in the times.

As to the rest of my property I wish my brother Thomas to sell
such portions as would go to ruin and such as may not be necessary for the children exercising his own discretion in the matter.

I wish my brother Thomas and his wife to take my children and
school them and do the best they can with them. I want my wife's
every day clothes to be taken out of the chest for my daughter
Amanda all my wife's fine clothes I wish to be can to her sister Mrs. Lindsey or Mrs. Benson to be kept for my daughter and
given to her as they may think should be them.
