In the Name of God Amen, November the first, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety one. — I John Pollock of the State of South Carolina and County Pendleton, being very sick and weak of body, but of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given to God, and casting to mind the mortality of my body, and that it is appointed to me once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament, Viz. I recommend my soul into the hands of God, who gave it, and for my body I recommend it to the earth, to be buried, in a Christian like and decent manner, at discretion of my Executors, nothing doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God, and as touching such worldly Estates as it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life, I give, devise, and dispose of the same in the following manner. Viz.

In the first place will and bequeath unto my well beloved wife Elizabeth, one hundred acres of land, together with all my movable property, only excepting four cows and five yearlings, which I give as a present gift to my beloved Daughter Elizabeth, also one cow and calf, I give in the same manner to my beloved Daughter Ann.

Also I give to my beloved Sons, James, Samuel & John, nine hundred acres of land, including all my improvements, and to be divided amongst them as follows, my old improvements, with three hundred acres, I give to my son James, my Mansion house with three hundred, I give to my son John, only allowing my beloved wife Elizabeth, the benefit and use of said Mansion house during her life, and the remaining three hundred acres to my son Samuel, all which divisions to be made to the best advantage, at the discretion of my Executors.

My Improvements, known by David Grays, place, together with one hundred and twenty acres of land, I will and bequeath to my beloved Daughter Sarah.

I will and bequeath to my beloved Daughter, Elizabeth my land lying on the waters of Broadway, containing two hundred acres. — The remainder of my lands, to be divided equally amongst my daughters Ann & Mary, and to the child unborn, I will and ordain, that if it is a boy his name shall be called Williamson, who shall heir an equal inheritance with my other Sons, and, if a girl, I will that her name be Regieah, and that she shall have an equal inheritance with my Daughters, and I do hereby ratify and confirm this my last will and testament, together with my Executors Elizabeth and James Pollock, and in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal, this day and year first above written.
