ATTESTED AT SCOTTSBURG ON THE 27. 1857.

I, Morgan Morgan, of the State and District aforesaid calling to mind the mortality of my body knowing it is appointed for all men once to die do think it proper to make this my last will and testament first of all my just debts being paid I do will that my wife Elizabeth Morgan enjoy peaceable possession of the home plantation Grist mill and cotton machine together with the dwelling house household and kitchen furniture and plantation tools together with all necessary and usefull things upon a plantation for her benefit with as much of the stock as she may deem necessary for her use and support and so continue during her life or widowhood and at her death or marriage to another man the balance to be returned back to my children.

I will also that my wife Elizabeth Morgan be my Executrix and my son David Morgan my Executor and if anye ballance of property ever and aforesoe the aforementioned support of my wife I will that it be distributed among the posterity of my Executors and as much to the benefit and particularitie of my Children equally either by selling or dividing it and I will that the ballance of money left us by our friends deceased in England as my execuse be for the sole benefit of my wife Elizabeth Morgan.
