February 20, 1845.

I, William Alexander, of the State of South Carolina and District
of Pickens, being to mind and body being weak in
body but of sound mind and memory doe think fit to dispose of my
personal estate in the following manner - I will that
my body be decently buried at the expence of my Executors and my
soul to God that give it.

First I will to my beloved wife Anny all my land and property
to raise my children on induring her life or widowhood and as my
children goes to themselves to have a portion give to them as may
be thought proper, and at the expiration of above term the remainder
of the above stated property to be sold and equally divided a among
my children. My shop and wagon I will to my sons Jacob, Daniel,
James, John, Tomas, William, Harrison for thar use also I will that my
money be collected and my son Jacob to have his part and the rest to
be put at interest again till call for.

I also will and appoint my beloved wife with my sun Jacob Alexander & Brother Thomas Alexander as my Executors to transact my business. Witness whereoff I have unto set my hand and fixt my seal
this day and date above written.
