do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner
and form following (that is to say) I give and bequeath unto my
beloved wife Jennet Hawthorn Negroes namely Nancy. Kate, Leah,
Jeffry and Frank and also all my stock of Horses, cattle and
Hogs & Sheep and all my Household furniture and plantation
Tools and likewise the plantation I now live on her lifetime and
in case she have any issue after her death the above property
or what of it left to be equally divided between the said issue
(if any) and my sister Susannah Owens children and William
Grahams Children, Samuel Hawthorns Daughter Jane, to have one
hundred Dollars after she comes of age, but in case my Wife ~~she~~
should live untile or after she the s^d Jane Hawthorn comes of
age the above s^d hundred Dollars must not be paid her untile or
after my Wifes death, I give unto Jenny Daniel, Elizabeth Danie^l,
June Daniel, and Martha Daniel Daughters to James Daniel each
Ten Dollars after my wifes death I give and bequeath unto Samue^l
Owens my Nephew the Gun that belong^d to my Father Sam^l Hawthorn,
I give and bequeath unto my Nephew James Owens my own Gun, said
Guns to be given after my death--I bequeath and give unto Hugh
Hawthorn one Shilling if demand after my Wifes death, I bequeat
and give unto Nancy Chandler one Shilling if demand after my
wifes death, I bequeath & give unto Margaret Chandler one Shil-

seal the twentieth day of January in the year of our Lord one
thousand eight hundred and seventeen-----
