In the Name of God Amen.

I James Gibson of W^m burghs district State of South Carolina, Turner by trade being in health of body and of sound mind and Memory and understanding, prais'd be to God for the same, do make this my last will and testament in manner and form following. First, I will and desire that I may be decently buried in the burying yard in the Plantation formerly belong to Samuel Jones deceas'd, I give and bequeath unto my belove'd daughter, Jannat Green twenty dollars, and to my son in law George Green one dollar, I give and bequeath to my Grand son Robert James Patterson twenty dollars, when he arrives to the age of twenty one, or at his marriage, I give and bequeath to my belov'd daughter Margaret Camron the two following Negroes Named Mingo and Ginny and the increase of Ginny to my belov'd daughter Margaret Camron and her lawfull issue forever--and to my son in law Henry Camron one dollar, I give and bequeath to my belov'd daughter Martha Gibson, the following Negroes Namely, Naro Candas Frank and also my negroe woman Amey and her increase to my belov'd daughter Martha Gibson and her lawfull issur Forever, I give and bequeath to my belov'd daughter Mary Fluitt one negroe girl named Elizabeth and her increase to my belov'd daughter and her lawfull issur Forever----- It is my desire that the Girl betty which is not dispos'd of in my will for to be valued if there is any need necessity for so doing, and my son in law Samuel Fluitt to take her at the value if my daughter Martha can not redeem her and I do nominate and Constitute and Appoint my son in law Sameul Fluitt and James Gamble Executors of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking and making Void all and

testament in manner and form following. First, I will and desire that I may be decently buried in the burying yard in the Plantation formerly belong to Samuel Jones deceas'd, I give and bequeath unto my belov'd daughter, Jannet Green twenty dollars, and to my son in law George Green one dollar, I give and bequeath to my Grand son Robert James Patterson twenty dollars, when he arrives to the age of twenty one, or at his marriage, I give and bequeath to my belov'd daughter Margaret Camron the two following Negroes Named Mingo and Ginny and the increase of Ginny to my belov'd daughter Margaret Camron and her lawfull issue forever--and to my son in law Henry Camron one dollar, I give and bequeath to my belov'd daughter Martha Gibson, the following Negroes Namely, Naro Candas Frank and also my negroe woman Amey and her increase to my belov'd daughter Martha Gibson and her lawfull issue Forever, I give and bequeath to my belov'd daughter Mary Fluitt one negroe girl named Elizabeth and her increase to my belov'd daughter and her lawfull issue Forever----- It is my desire that the Girl betty which is not dispos'd of in my will for to be valued if there is any need necessity for so doing, and my son in law Samuel Fluitt to take her at the value if my daughter Martha can not redeem her and I do nominate and Constitute and Appoint my son in law Samuel Fluitt and James Gamble Executors of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking and making Void all and every other will and wills at any time heretofore by me made, and do declare this to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto, set my hand and seal this sixteenth day of June in the in the year of our lord one thousand Eight hundred twenty five and in Forty ninth year of American Independance
