In the Name of God Amen---I William Stevenson Sen'r of York
District and State of South Carolina, Being Afflicted in
Body, But Duly Sensible (Blessed be God for his Mercies)
Do Make and ordain this My Last Will, & Testament, in the
following Manner, VIZ. My Soul, I Recommend to God who
gave it,--And my Bodey, to be Inter'd, in A Christian
Manner, At the Discretion of My Exec't'res---I Allow Any
Just Debt Comeing against me to be Setled, there is Two
Notes giv'n by me to Rebecca Paterson, one of Sixteen, the
other of Forty one Dollars, which My Son Matthew Stevenson,
has Receiv'd in his own name I Allow to be Setled---I Desire
that David, Hugh, & Robert Watson, Value the Plantation, on which
I now Live---

I Allow my Son William Stevenson, to have a Line Continued
from the Corner of the Sixteen Acres, I let him have to My Line
by the York Road, And whatever the Land Comes to more than his
Share, I Allow him to Settle up with the other Legatees---I
Allow My Daughter Folley, and Barbarah, to have the House in
which I now Live, The Wheat, and Corn that is made, also the
Wheat that is in the Ground, I Allow them what Meet we have, I
Allow each of them to have Fifty Dollars to be Laid off to
them in Land, round about the House in which we now live, Also,
an equal, share with the rest of the Legatees---I Allow my Son
Matthew Stevenson, to have the Remainder of my Land, and he
is to Settl up with the other Legatees---I Allow Korey if he
Desires to be Sold, to be Sold, at publick Sale, If Not, I
allow the Above Appraisers to Value him, and some of My
Legatees to keep him, by paying the other Legatees their
part of him,--

I Also Allow my Black Hors to be Apprais'd, and if any
of my Legatees wish to keep him at the Apraisment for them
to have him, if not Let him be sold--Lastly I appoint,
My Son Matthew Stevenson & John Watson to execute this my
last will and Testament, In Witness Whereof I do hereunto
Set my Hand and Seal this Twentieth day of December 1817
