The State of Alabama } On this 1st day of February
 Before me }
 I personally appeared before the Judge of the County
 Court of Pickens having with me James H. Hays
 a Resident of the State of Alabama in the County
 of Pickens who being the person who being filed
 duly sworn according to law with in his oath
 under the following declaration in order to obtain
 the benefit of the act of February passed June 2nd
 1832 that he entered the service of the United
 States under the following named officers, and
 service at certain stated times. This applicant also
 that he entered the service in his first term in the
 year 1836 (the month not recollecting) as a volunteer
 under the command of Col. Richard Pickens and
Captain Joseph Pickens, was involved in what
 was then called the Cherokee first or second King
 of the Cherokee Nation, &c, where the applicant then
 resided against a party of the Cherokee Indians, in
 a scouting party, in the State of Georgia, but the enemy
 fled into the interior of the State, and the com-
 pany to which then applicant being not ordered
 home after the same without receiving any money
 or discharge, having been out on this time other weeks
 in a few days he volunteered again under the
 same officer at that time to guard some wagons
 to move horses in, the State of G. was in no
 engagement until the returned home from guarding
 the wagons before mentioned, when he was called
 out again as a volunteer under the same officer,
 & before named to go against a party of Tories to
 was making their way to Augusta, Ga, but did not
 meet them until they were crossing French
 River at the mouth of French Creek in the State
 of Georgia where they attacked them and fought
 them for the space of two hours & some minutes
 but being out of ammunition was forced to have the
 ground in their possession as being but eight or ten
 fighting men and the Tories the side of ~~the~~
 ground in this engagement he received a wound
 by a ball in his left knee and was covered up
 of the ground from where he went home being
 unfit for service, when he lay for three
 or four months before he recovered of his wound
 This applicant also says after he recovered of the
 wound before named he again went out in a
 scouting party and continued of in the same until
 in the month of June 17th 39 when he went to
 study law (now Cambridge in North Carolina.

and danger that place and had frequent skirmishes with the enemy for the space of some weeks when the first Major & Long was taken by Col. Buzard from Charleston, and in the event, sent from the then Commanding Officer raised the siege, and marched us to Beaufort, 21 miles from Charleston where we remained for the space of two months when we were discharged and returned home without receiving another discharge - in the above mentioned at ninety days Captain Joseph Jackson was killed and the Command of the company devolved on Captain William Stearns. Major Buzard of this discharged the body as before and returned to the same place (Beaufort) having been in actual service the above three months & three weeks I then volunteered under Col. Jackson and Capt. William Stearns to go after some more Indians in the Cherokee station trying to get the Indians that were taken there, and being there to assist the British about the time my friends our destination the Indians had refused them to Col. Jackson, the rest having left and left the party and gave notice - Col. Jackson having delivered the Tige Indians to the blood of Georgia, we returned home and was discharged, in the spring of the year 1798, which ending my service during the Revolution struggle.

In answer to the first inquiry, my propounds of the Court I give for answer, that I was born in the State of Maryland, but having lost the favor of my eye could not read or write - having another thought, I answer the party, I give for answer, that I was living in South Carolina, specifically in the town of Beaufort, in the year 1798 I found it necessary to go to Beaufort County, also where I still reside I entered the service as a volunteer in answer to the 6th I give for answer that I had passed the Regulars and was ordered to the 6th I never received any further discharge, and as to the 9th I should be of my country - do.
