Samuel Snoddy, wife Elizabeth. W8744 and BLWt 18371-160-55

State of South Carolina, Spartanburg District. On 8 March 1850, Elizabeth (X her mark) Snoddy, age 79, stated that Samuel Snoddy entered the service in Spartanburg District (then Ninety-Six District) S.C. in Col. Roebuck's Regt.; that he served in the militia under Captain John Collins and was in the battle of Blackstocks and Cowpens; that they were married on 16 October 1791 and the date of her marriage is on page 1 of the family record in Samuel's handwriting, and that her husband died on 21 April 1817.

28 March 1850, Margaret (X her mark) Caldwell, age 72, widow of William Caldwell, Revolutionary Soldier and pensioner, and as his widow is drawing a pension of \$80 per annum, stated that she is acquainted with Mrs. Elizabeth Snoddy, widow of Samuel Snoddy, and this deponent was married to William Caldwell in December of 1792 and that the said Elizabeth Snoddy was married to Samuel Snoddy about one year before; that she distinctly remembers that the eldest son of said Elizabeth Snoddy was born in fodder gathering the day before this deponent was married; that she was at the house of the said Elizabeth and Samuel Snoddy the day after the birth of their son; that from the birth of the said son of Elizabeth and Samuel Snoddy and for about one year previous she had been intimately acquainted with them; and that Elizabeth and Samuel Snoddy lived together as man and wife and raised a large and highly respectable family of children; that she has often heard her husband speak of Samuel Snoddy as a Whig during '76; that her eldest child was born in October 1793 and that the oldest child of Elizabeth Snoddy, whose name was John, was more than a year older, and Elizabeth is a lady of good character.

Samuel Snoddy was born in the year 1761 May 1 John Snoddy was born in the year 1792 September 14. Ann Snoddy was born in the year 1795 May 5. Margaret Snoddy was born in the year 1798 Jenery 27. Isaac Owen Snoddy was born 14 November 1800 Mary Snoddy was born in the year 1803 Jun 29. Andrew Snoddy was born in the year 1806 February 8.

On 16 Apr 1850 John Snoddy stated that he is the son and eldest child of Samuel and Elizabeth Snoddy, that he was 57 on 14 September last, and that the writing in the family bible is the handwriting of Samuel Snoddy; that he has heard Samuel Snoddy speak of being in the battles of Blockstocks and Cowpens; that he has heard him speak of being commanded by Captain John Collins, and that his father died in April 1817.

On 17 April 1850 Samuel Miller, age 81, stated that he knew Samuel Snoddy from his earliest recollection, knew him during the Revolution and that he was of a Whig family, and knew Samuel and Elizabeth since they were married.

On 3 March 1852 Elizabeth Snoddy, age 83, applied for Bounty land and stated that her maiden name was Elizabeth Cowan.

On 12 August 1852, Henry (X his mark) Jameson, age 90, stated that he removed from the state of Pennsylvania in the year 1784 and settled in Spartanburg District S.C. and shortly afterwards became acquainted with Samuel Snoddy and that he remembers that Samuel Snoddy went to Abbeville District S.C. to get married about the year 1790 or 1791 and that he was at John Snoddy's, the father of Samuel Snoddy, when he returned with his wife.

On 14 January 1853, H. J. Dean stated that Mrs. Snoddy resided about 15 miles from the Court House.

- 14 June 1853, Margaret Caldwell, age 75, widow of William Caldwell, stated that Samuel Snoddy and her husband served under Jonathan Collins who is now dead but who drew a pension in his lifetime, and that there was no other Samuel Snoddy in this part of the country.
- 14 June 1853, Catherine (X her mark) Powers, age 90 years, stated that she was acquainted with John and Samuel Snoddy in the time of the Revolution and that they were both soldiers and served under Captain John Collins and that John Snoddy was killed by the Tories and that Samuel Snoddy was the husband of Elizabeth Snoddy who is now claiming a pension.

Nancy Thompson, age 85, said on 14 June 1853 that she was acquainted with Samuel Snoddy in the Revolution and that he was a soldier under her brother Captain John Collins.
