Miles to raise my children on, at her death or intermarriage it is  
my desire that my Executor should manage my estate in that  
way & manner in which he may think most to the interest of my  
children as fully & freely as if I myself were present to act

of Cooke at the courthouse in Newport in said County on the fourth  
Monday in August in the year of our Lord one thousand eight  
hundred and twenty four being the twenty third day of said month  
by before the worshipful Saml. Findings James Allen and  
Richard B. Swette Esqs Justices of the peace and commissioned to  
hold said Court, a paper purporting to be the last will & testament

Elizabeth Hogan daughter of W. C. Hogan (and my wife) two hundred  
and fifty dollars each to Edward C. Carnayon and Charles J. Porter  
Carnayon sons of Preston B. Carnayon to be exclusively applied to their  
Education. the balance I give equally to brother Charles William James  
Conway. I appoint Charles J. Porter William C. Hogan and Major  
William Conway Executors to this my last will and Testament. In  
Witness Whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 20<sup>th</sup> day of  
August 1821. Edward Conway D signed & sealed in the presence of  
Casswell Lee Samuel Erwine. Which said last will and Testament so  
produced was duly proven in court by the oath of Casswell Lee and  
Samuel Erwine the two subscribing witnesses thereat as the law directs  
and recorded. And thereupon the said William C. Hogan and Charles  
J. Porter two of the Executors in said Will named with the leave of  
the court in open court took upon themselves the execution thereof  
were qualified as Executors and entered into bond and security for their  
faithful performance as such as the law directs all of which was
