Heasant Lees Will

In the name of God amen I Heasant Lee of the
County of Dallas and State of Alabama, laboring under bodily
affliction but being perfectly sound and Compoent in mind
Knowing the certainty of Death and yet the uncertainty of
the time when that solemn event may take place
think it necessary for me to arrange my Temporal Concerns
at this time and do hereby do make and Ordain this my
last will and testament in manner and form following
viz: First I bequeath unto my Daughter Elizabeth Cox
During ~~my~~ her natural life the following property to wit
Eloise Heynes Smith, Dilla, Harriett, Caroline -
Grace, Vilett, Sandy, Jane, Martin, Anne, Bobe
and Cydial and also two Beds and furniture and two
Red Stands and four Stands of Curtains One large
Chest One Trunk One Space Candel, Stock One
gig, Trunk and one female Dog and if my daughter
Elizabeth Cox should have a heir or heirs of
her body of her body to live I give the above
named property together with the increase to her child
or children so the Case may be and if my daughter
should have no heir or heirs born of her body
then I give the above property then in that
I give the above named property
unto my Grand Child
daughter Anne Anne

and at my death I give unto my Daughter Elizabeth
Cof, One Thousand Dollars in Cash

Second I give unto my daughter Nancy, Nancy during
her natural life the following property, to wit, Eleven Acres
more or less, Ruffin, Laker, Eliza, Fanny, Sarah, Luke
Hitt, Larkin, Sam and Luke four beds and three
Bedsteads and All Bedding furniture not otherwise
disposed of and one trunk and at the death of my
daughter Nancy, Nancy, I give the above named
property together with the increase unto my Grand
Children the Children of Nancy, Nancy - to be
Equally Divided among them All.

Third I give unto my Daughter Nancy, Nancy,
after Discharging all my debts All the money that
is now on hand or may hereafter be and all the money
that is now due or owing unto me or may hereafter
be due or owing unto or in any wise coming to me,
and all my lands that I now have or may hereafter be
possessed of, and, also the crop that is or may be on
hand at my death and also the stock of Horses,
Hogs & Cattle that I may be possessed of in my
last will at my death together with All other property
not otherwise disposed of by this will that is in
any wise belonging to me or may be at my death.

I do constitute and appoint my friend James
Nancy for Executor for the purpose of carrying
this my last will and testament into effect, hereby
revoking all other wills heretofore by me made or
instruments of writing purporting to be such wills
inasmuch as I have, hereunto set my hand and
seal this 28 day of September 1843 - Pleasant Lee

Joseph Lee - The State of Alabama Dallas
County Special Chancery Court September 18th day
of 1843. This day personally appeared in open
Court John H Boggan one of the subscribing witnesses

and oath that he saw Pleasant Lee sign seal
and execute the same as and for her last will and
testament and that she said testatrix was of sound
mind and disposing memory at the time of executing
the same and that he then deponent John McCandlish
Jr and Joseph Lee all signed and sealed as witnesses
at the request of and in the presence of the said testatrix

State of Maryland each the sum of one dollar &
also give and bequeath to my Sister Barbary Weaver
all the rest of my estate both Real and Personal
including the undivided Interest I have in my Father's
estate both Real and Personal - as part of my legacy
I further appoint my Uncle Philip S Weaver of the
County and State aforesaid my sole Executor
as Witness my hand and Seal this Eighteenth day of
October Eighteen Hundred and Thirty Six George S
