Eight Negroes. Hops, Apples, Wheat, Corn, Potatoes, Cattle, Horses, Sheep, plantations
Fields, & Household & Kitchen Furniture & every other species of property that
is mine, and I hereby appoint Maria Brantley, Maria Center & John
Brantley Sole Executors of this my last will and testament

thought fit and proper to make my will and testament, and that I am
now in a state of health and of sound mind and disposing memory have
thought proper to divide my worldly goods in the following manner

I now live with all of the stock of every description, and Crops that may be
growing on my farm, all household Furniture and my library as much
of my Library as she shall choose to keep the remainder of it

my Wife may desire as she ^{shall} see fit, also I leave to her for
the same term the following Negroes ^{my} Roger, Amy, Milley,
Tom, Nace, Ruby Ann a girl I give to her as a gift in fee simple
but not to be sold by her during her life at her death she may make a
good and legal sale of her

Second, I give unto my son Robert, Daphne, and her son Charles
I give unto my daughter Mary Johnson, a Negro Boy John

3rd I give unto my daughter Betty, John a Negro Boy Leno. I
give unto my daughter Peggy, May a Negro Boy that she has in possession
a Boy named Matt I give unto my grand daughter Margaret, John the
daughter of Robert & Betty a girl named Sarah. I give unto my grand
daughter Margaret John the daughter of Robert & Mary three Negroes
two girls viz Theria, Jennies, and a Boy William

I give unto my grand daughter Margaret a Negro girl named
Gessia

At the decease of my wife Daphne the land and Negroes stock
and property of mine of any description put into money and to my Grand son
Robert John Johnson I give five hundred Dollars and unto my Grand son
Robert Calvin John I give five hundred Dollars, and also my grand
daughter Margaret Johnson the sum of four hundred Dollars but if the
property left at her decease shall not raise these sums they shall arise
in this several proportions if it should bring more my children to arise
equally. My Grand daughter Margaret John that lives with me to
carry her Negroes at marriage or at Eighteen years of age, any of
the parents or guardian of them my grand children wishing to draw for any
of my grand children before legal age shall give good security for the
delivery of the property to the ^{custodian of the said property} the person for whom they may draw

And I hereby do constitute and appoint my son and Nace, and
Robert John my son and alone executors of this my last will and
testament according all other made by me written by our hands and
being done in the best manner I am capable of although I cannot
say it is perfect I believe at this time I can say it is right and may
my heirs & I have had no local pre disposition and endeavoured to
do justly and I do hereby ratify and acknowledge it in the presence of
my bed I have affixed to it before
