

State of Alabama Dallas County March 11th 1835
In the name of God Amen; To all whom it may concern be it known that I William Rupel Morrison of the State and County aforesaid being aware of the uncertainty of life, and the certainty of death and being now sound both in body and mind do make ordain publish and declare the following to be my last will and Testament (viz) In the first place it is my will and desire that all my property both real and personal shall be at the full and entire disposal of my beloved wife Vicy Campbell Morrison for the support and education of my children and that she pay my debts and that she sell any part of my property either real or personal which her own judgment may dictate if she may consider it necessary - and that she divide off to my children Ann Catherine Morrison Margaret Cornelia Morrison and Eliza Jane Morrison as soon as they come of age or marry as much of my property as she may think she can spare and that at her death the whole shall be equally divided amongst my children above named. It is my will that my beloved wife Vicy Campbell Morrison be the executrix of this my will

The State of Alabama Autauga County In The Name
of God Amen I Robert S Carson of the County of Dallas
and State aforesaid of sound Mind and Memory
do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament
hereby Revoking all other Wills Deeds of Gifts &c.

Item 1st I Will after my death that God Receive my Spirit
who Gave it Item 2^d I Will that my body be decently
buried and all my funeral Expences be paid Item 3rd I
Will that all my just and lawful debts be paid
Item 4th I Will that all my property be kept together
after my death till my youngest Child comes of age and
if after my death my Wife Should be delivered of a child
of which she is now pregnant I Will that that the property
be all kept together till the said Child becomes of age
Item 5th I Will as soon as my youngest Child comes of
age that all my property be Equally divided and all the sum
Incomes of the same amongst the following persons My Wife
Baby My Son Andrew Jackson, Francis Marion my
Daughter Pardee Nancy and the Child with which she
is now Pregnant Item 6th I Will that the oldest Son
named Robert Porter which was born in Wedlock between
me and my wife some short time after our marriage
I Will that the aforesaid Robert Porter Receive Good Every
day Cloths and Two Years Schooling a Good horse and
saddle and one hundred Dollars and one Good Suit of
fine Cloths Item 7th I Will that the plantation known
as my present residence better Known as the North
East quarter of Section Eight in Township Sixteen
