ARKANSAS RESEARCH

One of the most important keys to successful research in any state is a thorough knowledge of the formation of it's counties.

Two maps have been included in this issue to further aid the researcher in obtaining a clear picture of Arkansas counties. Study the map of Arkansas Territory in 1819, and then note the changes made by adding 32 counties on the map of 1836. This was the year Arkansas became a State. In later issues, we will have at least one other, possibly two, additional maps showing formation of counties until all 75 were formed.

In searching for family names in records of a certain county, the researcher can readily trace back to the parent county. Keep in mind that many of the new counties were formed from several counties and that county lines were moved from time to time. Knowledge of the date or approximate time ancestors arrived in a county is very helpful but if not known can be determined usually by searching the county tax records.

If the county is not known nor the approximate date ancestors arrived in Arkansas, the researcher should first search the index to the 1830 and 1240 census of Arkansas. Prior to 1830, check the Territorial Records. By 1850 there were 53 counties in Arkansas which makes it highly impractical to search each county, however, a great number of the 1850 county census have been transcribed and alphabetized. In future issues, we will take up the problem of locating an ancestor when only the name is known and the various sources to search and in what sequence.

The five original parent counties are shown below with the subsequent counties carved from them through 1836.





The name sources for Arkansas counties extend to a great variety. The state's 75 counties are named for governors, congressmen, presidents of the United States, judges, pioneers, explorers — in fact, the name sources include just about every stratum of society, from Arkansas legislators to foreign noblemen. Also, some are named for rivers and other geological formations.

A county was named for each of Arkansas' territorial governors - Hiller, Izard, Pope and Fulton. The first three counties were created during Arkansas' territorial period, 1819 to 1836. Fulton County was not formed until 1842, six years after Arkansas became a state.

Arkansas has had 36 state governors, but only three counties were named for state governors - Drew, Baxter and Yell.

Although the state's first governor was James Conway and the fifth governor was Elias N. Conway, Conway County was named for Henry M. Conway, Arkansas' territorial delegate to Congress at the time the county was formed in 1825.

James Conway, at that time, was a surveyor and had lived in Arkansas only five years. Elias II. Conway did not move to Arkansas until 1833, eight years after the county was created.

Garland County was named for Augustus H. Garland, who was a governor of Arkansas, but not at the time the county was formed. On April 5, 1873, when this county was added, Garland was practicing law in Little Rock. He had been a delegate to the state convention of 1861, and, although opposed to secession, asquiesced in the will of the majority. He had served in the provisional Confederate Congress throughout the Civil Nar. But he did not become governor of Arkansas until the next year after Garland County was created. He went on to serve in the U. S. Senate and later as attorney general ander President Cleveland.

Clay County was originally named Clayton, but it was not named for Gov. Powell Clayton. John H. Tayton, then a member of the State Senate, was the one honored.

Clark County was named for a governor, but not for Arkansas' Gov. James P. Clarke, who was not born until 36 years after the county was formed. It was named for Gov. William Clark of Missouri Territory.

Of Arkansas' 36 state novernors, 22 have served since 1883 when the last county was created.

Pike County, formed Movember 1, 1833, was named for Lt. Zebulon M. Pike, an early 19th century explorer of the south-

west. Arkansas'illustrious Albert Pike at about that time, was a young pedagogue and teaching a one-room school near Van Buren, Arkansas, for \$4 a menth, half of which was paid in money and the other half in pics.

Ten counties are named for presidents of the United States. There is a county named for President U. S. Grant, who apparently had little respect for the South, but Johnson County was not named for President Andrew Johnson, who was favorable to the South. The reason: Johnson County was formed November 16, 1833. At that time Andrew Johnson, 25 years old, was learning to read and write and was holding his first public office - alderman of Greenville, Tennessee. Johnson County was named for Benjamin Johnson, an Arkansas territorial judge.

The other counties named for presidents are Hashington, Honroe, Jefferson, Jackson, Van Buren, Hadison, Polk, Lincoln and Cleveland.

Arkansas County is the oldest. It was created by the Territorial Legislature of Hissouri, December 31, 1813, and embraced about nine-tenths of the present state of Arkansas. Four other counties - Lawrence, Clark, Hempstead and Pulaski were also formed by the Hissouri Territorial Legislature.

ililler County was the first county added after Arkansas became a territory. It was formed April 1, 1820, a d named for James Hiller, the first territorial governor. Ifuch of the territory in the original county belonged to the Republic of Nexico, since the boundary between the United States and Texas had not been established. In 1838 Texas was accused of usurping jurisdiction over Hiller County. As a consequence, the county was disordanized and the territory attached to Lafayette County. The boundary dispute was settled after the war with Nexico for Texas independence in 1849. Hiller County was reestablished with its present boundaries on December 22, 1874.

Boone County, according to the late Dallas T. Herndon, state historian for many years, "was named for Daniel Boone, the celebrated Kentucky pioneer and Indian fighter." But other historical sources, including the Arkansas Almanac, say the county, created April 9, 1869, from territory talen from Carroll and Hadison counties, was originally "Boon." When the legislature was asked to create it, the sponsor of the bill is supposed to have said it would be a "boon" for those residents who could not without difficulty reach the county seat of Carroll. It is not known when spelling of the name took on the "e".

Nevada County is the only one named for a state. It was named for the state of Nevada because, according to official sources, the outline of the county is somewhat similar to the outline of the state. But the pronunciations differ. The

state is pronounced "nee VAD an." The county is pronounced "nee VADE ah."

Five counties were named for fivers. They are St. Francis, Mississippi, Quachita, Little River and White. Mhile some historians say the county was named for White River, which forms the greater part of the castern boundary, others contend that it was named for Much L. White of Tennessee, at that time the Whic Party candidate for President.

Seven other counties were named for natural formations Lonoke, for the "lone oak" that stood in Lonoke, now the
county seat; Saline, for the salt springs; Stone, for the
geological structure of the region; Prairie, for the open
country; Chicot, for Point Chicot (the French for "stump")
on the Hississippi River, and Hot Spring, for the hot springs
which then lay within the boundaries. The springs were lost
to the county with the formation of Garland County 44 years
later.

Columbia County was named for the Goddess of Liberty, Independence County for the Declaration of Independence, and Union County for the Union of States.

Cleveland County, formed April 17, 1873, was first called Dorsey County, in honor of Stephen M. Dorsey, then one of the U. S. senators from Arkansas. In 1885 the name was changed to Cleveland, honoring Grover Cleveland, Who had just become president of the United Status.

Logan County, created Parch 22, 1871, was originally named Sauber County, for a state senator. Four years later, the name was changed in order to honor James Logan, one of the pioneers of that section.

Lovely County was formed October 13, 1827, and continued to October 28, 1828. In his history, "Arkansas and Its People," Dr. David Y. Thomas dubbed it the "lost county of Lovely."

In 1816 Milliam and Peter Lovely purchased a tract of land from the Osage Indians, which was included in the Mestern boundary of Arkansas, as laid down in 1824. This territory eventually became Lovely County, or the majer part of it. Unfortunately, this same region had been granted to the Cherokee Indians in 1818, creating difficulties which were not settled until 1828, when the present boundary of Arkansas was established. As a consequence of the settlement, most of Lovely County was made a part of the Indian Territory, now the state of Oklahoma. What remained in Arkansas of the original area of Lovely County, finally became a part of Mashington County, formed in 1828.

liarion County was the first created after Arkansas became a state and Cleburne County was the last. (Article taken from the Arkansas Democrat -research by Karr Shannon).

ARKANSAS CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS

SOME INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT ARKANSAS' ROLE IN THE CIVIL WAR

Arkansas was second only to Virginia in the percentage of men of military age, and second to North Carolina in the number of battle casualties. Arkansas was the only state that furnished men that marched in every command and participated in every major campaign. It was the only state that had more men killed in battle and those men now lie buried in every state that was in the Confederacy. All this despite the fact that 9,600 Arkansans served in the Union Army.

The Third Arkansas Regiment was the only Arkansas unit serving in Lee's Army of Virginia. The battle cry of the Third Arkansas was "First in, last out", and their footprints were left in all the great battles of the Civil War. They were the shock troops of the war and were in the first battle at Bull Run and also the last battle at Gettysburg.

No Arkansan among "The Immortal Six Hundred" took the oath of allegiance. There were six hundred Confederate officers captured and held prisoner in the stockade at Morris Island, South Carolina, under fire of Confederate guns then shelling the island; and who were 'subsequently starved on rations of rotten corn meal and onion pickle at Fort Pulaski, Georgia, and Hilton Head, South Carolina, 1864-65, by order of Edwin M. Staunton, United States Secretary of War. Among these Confederate Officers were a number of Arkansans captured in Arkansas in 1863, whose names are listed below:

ARKANSAS MILITARY BOUNTY GRANTS FOR THE WAR OF 1812 is one of the finest genealogical publications that we have had the pleasure to review. It is the first published work of Katheren Christensen and we hope that this volume will be followed by many more containing the same quality work and wealth of genealogical data.

This 255 page reference book contains a complete index and gives the names and other genealogical data on the men who fought in the War of 1812 and for their services were given land grants in Arkansas. It lists name of applicant, warrent number, patent date, comments and the county in which the land was located.

Research in this book is not limited to Arkansas as many of the men included never moved to the Arkansas Territory. Many exchanged their grants and a great number of the men are thought to have "passed through" Arkansas on their way to Texas and the great southwest.

It is an excellent source for finding the name and location of an ancestor, or other family members, who emmigrated West during the early pioneer days. In many cases valuable genealogical data pertaining to the men and other members of their families are given. The Land Grants were located in the following early Arkansas Counties:
