Remarks: The most mountainous Counties, the principal diseases are typhoid & typhus fever, malarial fever, dysentery, the latter is abundant, small and fresh principal Sept. intertropical diseases, with a little head in the S. W. Springs are numerous and held, the prairie rough & broken hills, essentially, valleys & mountains the latter are lofty and rugged, with dense forests & a large portion of the year the hills are foggy and misty, the principal towns are the sparse and scattered, and large Madison & large mountain rocks, with occasional beds of bituminous shale, the valleys are low and lie along the streams, which are full of rapids, offering the greatest facilities to water power, the soil of this portion is mostly alluvial, with some beds of marble, the up or hill is mostly limestone.
