take in care. It is to be understood that I give to my son James  
Henry Brown and my daughter Mary Ann H. Brown and their heirs  
the part of my estate that I allow for them at the time and  
after they left me. I hereby appoint my friend and my sole executor to  
carry all the debts of me with acts official and give into his hands all  
my farming utensils, Wagon, Cornual and all my live stock of every kind  
not before mentioned to pay all my just and funeral expenses and to  
give to my grand son Andrew H. Brown fifteen dollars worth of as many  
necessaries. The above I give me of my force while I live but after my death to  
be in full force and action in law.

In the name of God Amen I Andrew Crocker of the  
County of Elbert and State of Tennessee hereby into consideration  
on the moralities of my body and believing that my disputation is  
now and being of sound mind and memory make this my last will and  
testament

First I wish all my just debts and funeral expenses to be  
paid. And I would give and bequeath to my beloved wife Mary  
W. Crocker one year provision for her and my little son Andrew  
also four track or land to wit the tract on which I now live the  
1st of 9. 10. 11. my above tract running up the river to the land then  
formerly owned by Lewis and my brother John Crocker also I  
leave in trust of a fifty acre tract and a large sum of money  
Containing in all by estimation ten hundred and sixty four cents  
one horse head which ever one she may choose one side I saddle and  
bridle her. And also the head of three pigs six sheep all  
all my household and kitchen furniture to have and to hold  
for her only use and benefit and for the raising and educating  
of my little son Andrew during her natural life or widowhood  
whichever is my son John Crocker will live with his mother and  
support her comfortably and live with her peaceably and and will cause  
to and issue his brother Andrew and when he is of age give him a horse  
saddle and bridle worth eighty dollars. I wish him to have the use of  
each lands and live with his mother's death and after her death the  
land to be divided between my two sons John and Andrew John to  
have two thirds of the lower end or as to include the buildings. And  
Andrew to have one third of the upper end to be divided according  
to the number of acres and quality without taking into consideration  
the buildings.

And thirdly I leave and bequeath unto my son James Crocker one  
hundred dollars to be paid as soon as it can be made out of the  
estate.

And fourthly I wish all my lands and property not mentioned in  
this will to be sold and the proceeds spent or created to pay my  
just debts funeral expenses and the living of James and what ever is  
left after the above is done I will to my son James Crocker.  
And fifthly I wish my son John Crocker and my

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I sell my lawful executor to wit the 1st of the above when  
in witness whereof I have set my hand and seal the 1st day of February  
1873

I James Crocker do make and publish this as my last will and testament  
and hereby declaring and making void all other wills by me at any time  
made. First I wish that my funeral expenses be paid as soon as possible  
paid as soon after my death as possible out of my money and that I  
my son James Crocker or my first son come into the house of my executor  
and bequeath to my beloved wife Mary Crocker  
and daughter all of the household and kitchen furniture together  
with the horse to be divided amongst them as my wife Mary may desire  
and my son and further for my wife and daughter to have possession  
of the house and to have throughout support of the plantation while  
she live or remains single. Also I give my wife Mary one hundred  
dollars for the use of the family.

Second I give and bequeath to my daughter George one hundred  
dollars with her saddle to have her support of the place while  
she live or remains single.

Third I give and bequeath to my daughter Jane one hundred  
dollars and her saddle and her support of the place while  
she remains single.

Fourth I give and bequeath to my daughter Martha one hundred  
dollars and her saddle with her support of the place as  
long as she remains single.

Fifth I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary one hundred  
dollars with her saddle and support of the place as long as  
she remains single.

Sixth I give and bequeath to my daughter Nancy one  
hundred dollars and a new saddle when needed with her  
support of the place as long as she remains single.

Seventh I give and bequeath to my daughter Ester one hundred  
dollars and a new saddle when needed with her support of  
the place while she remains single.

Eighth I give and bequeath to my son Matthew Henry one  
large good mare and a good saddle.

Ninth I give and bequeath to my son James B. and Matthew  
Henry the plantation this now live on which place Thomas  
and sister is to have their support of with all the furniture  
utensils and further after than is set about a sufficient quantity of  
grain and stock for one year support the balance to be sold  
and a third to be pay money before directed if they should  
not be enough to pay all of them if as directed J.B. and  
Matthew H. Crocker will pay the balance at a convenient time  
without interest in six payments I also allow a settlement to be made  
with James H. Crocker and my executor with the wife of  
James B. and Matthew Henry from the first of our separation  
I allow James H. Crocker to have the plantation and the land  
on and to support himself and family and to have the same
