State of Tennessee Blount County May 24<sup>th</sup> 1849

In the name of God Amen of James Eudsey of the County and State aforesaid being weak of body but of sound mind and disposing memory and aware of the certainty of my dissolution make and give in this my last will and testament in the following manner viz

- 1<sup>st</sup> I commit my spirit to God who gave it and my body to the care from which it was taken then to rest to the resurrection being fully assured that then it will be raised and reunited to my soul, Of the worldly substance with which the Lord in his kind Providence has blessed me I make the following disposition
- 2<sup>d</sup> That my funeral expenses and all my just debts be paid
- 3<sup>d</sup> I give with to my beloved wife Sarah Eudsey the plantation on which I live for her life time or during her widowhood and at her death to be equally divided between my three sons viz John Eudsey James A. Eudsey and William A. Gallant Eudsey, John Eudsey to have the negro and Calf and Arthur Dierck Eudsey to have the Choice of the rest of the horses, John Eudsey is to furnish William A. Gallant Eudsey with a horse three or four years old when he and William is twenty one years old, and James A. Eudsey is to have choice of the rest the horse is to have ten Stems for Cows for the use of the farm to run on the farm I<sup>st</sup> my wife to have three Cows and calves and all the stock on said and pigs Six of the best stock hogs and all the household and kitchen furniture two pair of Iron Dues and all the farming utensils also two saddles that belong to the farm I allow my wife to have my Library of Books to have and to read them during her natural life or widowhood, and at her death to be equally divided among all the children
- 4<sup>th</sup> I bequeath to my daughter Rebecca J. Eudsey one horse worth forty dollars one cow and Calf worth two dollars one bed and Calf furniture worth fifteen dollars one hog worth one dollar one sheep worth one dollar three three dollars worth of kitchen furniture one spinning wheel worth four dollars one side saddle worth twelve dollars this is the amount I have given Rebecca Eudsey and all that I allow her 6<sup>th</sup> I will and bequeath to my daughter Rebecca Eudsey one horse worth forty dollars one cow and Calf worth two dollars one bed and Calf and furniture worth fifteen dollars one hog worth one dollar one sheep worth one dollar three dollars worth of kitchen furniture one spinning wheel worth four dollars one side saddle worth twelve dollars
- 5<sup>th</sup> After my decease I allow all the rest of my property to be sold and all my just debts to be paid
- 6<sup>th</sup> I also appoint John Walker and Henry K. Coverters my Executors of this my last will and testament and allow them to collect all my debts and pay out the money according to the my last will. In testimony whereof I have set my hand and seal this day and date above mentioned

Secondly I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Sarah the one half of all my cows sheep and pigs, and the one half of all the household and kitchen furniture, Consisting of beds and furniture Cupboard and furniture tables Chairs and Cooking utensils and all money that may be left after the above named expenses within a month or otherwise to be disposed of at her pleasure and have a just support of my beloved estate during her natural lifetime. Thirdly I give and bequeath to my daughter Rebecca four one third man called Jude and the one half of the above named live stock and of the household and kitchen furniture equal with her mother, and also the one half of the farm in which I now live Consisting of 422 Acres more or less. Fourthly I give and bequeath to my son Wallace W. the one half of the above named farm the said farm to be equally divided between William and the above named Rebecca and of also give and bequeath to my son Wallace my Negro and Calf and all my farm utensils I fully having given to my sons David John W. Arthur W. William and Samuel a horse each a pig and intend them Six fully having given to my daughters Polly, Ellen and Eliza a horse and cow and beading a pig and all bequeath to them. Lastly I in hereby nominate and appoint my executor in various whereof I do to my will set my hand and seal this 10<sup>th</sup> day of March 1849

I David Eagleton of said County and State being weak in body but of sound mind and memory and knowing that if is appointed end for all men to die do make and publish this my last will and testament. In the first place I recommend my soul to God and my body to be buried in the Christian burial. In the second place I will the premises thereof now lie on to my son Robert K. Eagleton and the place I own on Tennessee to be sold and my son Robert to have five hundred and fifty dollars out of the sale of the same to redeem the land I now live on and the surplus to go to the support of my wife during her life all my stock and farming utensils I leave to my son Robert. Should anything remain of the sale of my Tennessee plantation after the decease of my wife I wish it to be divided betwixt my son James Eagleton and my daughter Margaret Cook as follows to wit to my son James two hundred dollars and to my daughter Margaret two hundred dollars and should there be any surplus or is to fall to my son Robert having given to all my other children their share of an hundred either all other wills hereby made by me and I do hereby appoint Robert Cook and Robert Eagleton as my executors.

of body but of sound and disposing mind and memory and knowing that it is appointed for all to die and being desirous when it shall please God to cause to call me home of leaving my worldly affairs arranged and settled do for that purpose hereby make ordain and publish this as my last will and testament to wit  
1. I will ~~direct~~ direct that all my just debts if any and my funeral expenses be paid.  
2. I give and bequeath to my wife Margaret Erving my present dwelling house and all my household and kitchen furniture also one horse and two cows and calves to be chosen by herself with the vicissitude of the hours for ten or twenty years past. Also all the money that I now have on hand except Eighty dollars which I give to my son in law W<sup>m</sup> Eagleton. And will and bequeath that she my said wife shall receive of the proceeds of my farm a competent and comfortable support during her natural life and likewise plenty of firewood prepared for use  
3. I give and bequeath to George E. Colloch son of Samuel M. Colloch my son in law my debt and Book Case  
4. I give and devise to my son in law Samuel M. Colloch and William Eagleton the tract of land on which I now live; to the said Samuel and his heirs and assigns all that part of said tract lying North and West of a line by which I have heretofore divided said tract beginning in the bank of Little River below the dam ford at a marked wild Cherry tree running towards the mouth of the Spring branch to the marked black oak Saplings then east westerly to two marked locusts in the field - then with a fence running across the Spring branch to a Stake - then with the fence parallel to the Spring branch to a Walnut in the orchard near the place above the pick up Machine then to a marked black oak Sapling on the left hand side of the road leading from my dwelling house to Mary Hill - then along said road to a marked Post Cast on the western boundary line of said tract when the same crosses said road; and to the said William and his heirs and assigns all that part of my said tract or original survey lying east and south of said dividing line to have or to hold the parts or parcels of land hereby given and devised as the same is herein divided and allotted unto the said Samuel and the said William respectively and their respective heirs and assigns with the tenements appurtenances and he accoutances to each part respectively appertaining and belonging as I will and bequeath that my moneys or property of my estate herein otherwise appropriated shall be equally divided among the children of my daughter Eleanor M. Colloch and Margaret Eagleton  
6. I will and bequeath to Elizabeth White who is now living her with twenty five dollars provided she survive with my wife Margaret during her natural life  
7. I do hereby will and appoint that my friends James Pillsbury Esqr. William Eagleton Samuel M. Colloch and Campbell Erving shall act as my executors in the execution of this my last will and testament who are hereby constituted and appointed and for that purpose and I hereby revoke disannul and set aside all other former will and testament by me at any time made and published herebefore.
