bow and calf also four heads of sheep. 5th I bequeath to my
daughter Deborah one bed and furniture and one bridle
huffer and four heads of sheep. 6th I bequeath all my farming
tools to my wife Catharine during her natural life.
7th I desire that my land and personal property at the
death of my wife Catharine be equally divided between
my daughter Sarah Ward and my son David and my
daughters Mary and my daughter Isabella and my son
James. 8th I bequeath to my son David one dollar at the death
of my wife Catharine 9th I bequeath to my son Robert one
dollar at the death of my wife Catharine.
10th I bequeath to my son Abraham one dollar at the death
of my wife Catharine. I hereby revoke and make void
and void all former wills by me made - I hereby appoint
William Garner and Joseph Holpaine my Executors at will - In
testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal
this 31st day of July A.D. 1836. this the thirty first day
of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty six.

my dollar apiece. 3^d - It is my will that my Grandson
Benjamin Minter that now lives with me shall have the Gray horse
I now own and also the saddle that is now in my possession.
4th - It is my will that my two daughters Deb and Matilda
or Mary shall have all that part of my property that my land
and that it shall be equally divided between them.
5th - It is my will and request that Thomas R. McNairy
execute this my last will as a willing and willing all persons
will oblige. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand

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In the name of God Amen I Alexander Malone of Blount County
and State of Tennessee do say that my bodily strength is
fading, and do conceive that the hour of my dissolution cannot
be very much longer. I bequeath and appoint to God who gave it
me in readiness at present I am weak in body although posses-
sed of perfect memory and understanding. I therefore do make and
constitute this my last will and testament and say
that it may be executed as such. 1st I resign my soul
to God who gave it hoping through the atonement of sufferings and
intercession of Jesus Christ that it shall when separated from
my body be received into and admitted within that life which
both foundations chose builded and maker is God. I next
commit my body to the Ground from whence it was taken
desiring that it may be humanely decently and in a Christian like
manner buried not forgetting but that in the morning of the
resurrection day my soul and body shall again be united
and clothed upon with immortality and impressed with
the image of my heavenly father shall be caught up to meet
the Lord of glory in the air and transparently shine
shout and praise the Lord through endless day. Next it is my
desire that all my lawful debts be punctually dis-
charged out of my estate and of the substance with which
it has pleased God to bless me with. I make the subsequent
bequeathments. First I bequeath to my loving and affectionate
wife Deborah the one third part of the plantation on which
I live or the one third part of its price during her widowhood
which said third is to include the one third part of the
cultivated ground and the mansion house and other

And she is to obtain a title for the land from the office her-
self or likewise bequeath to my wife Deborah the bed and furni-
ture she now occupies and one bed and one chest and likewise one
from the part of the cupboard and dresser furniture. Secondly
I bequeath to my son Elias H. Malcolm my saw mill tract of
land situate on Crooked Creek and one cow named Till and
her calf I bequeath to my son Alexander Malcolm the
remaining two thirds of the plantation on which I live and
he is to enter the land in the office and is to pay my son
George two hundred dollars in good trade if the land be
sold before it be taken out of the office and if the land
cannot be nor is not sold previous to its entry in the
office nor Alexander will not pay the above two hundred
dollars in good trade to my son George then George is to have
and fully possess the third and Alexander the other third
I likewise bequeath to my son Alexander a brown hupen
sown by the name of Bart's Kipper and likewise a small
walnut table. Fourthly I bequeath to my eldest daughter
Elizabeth one bed and furniture and a cow known by
the name of Burns and her calf and likewise one fourth
part of the dresser and cupboard garnes. Fifthly I bequeath
to my daughter Sally one bed furniture and one cow
and calf and one fourth part of the dresser and cup-
board furniture. Sixthly I bequeath to my daughter Elly
one bed and furniture one cow and calf and likewise one fourth
part of the dresser and cupboard furni-
ture. Seventhly I bequeath to my son Joseph five
dollars to be discharged in a horse when the tract of land
that I have on Barber's Creek is sold. Eighthly I bequeath
to my son Walter ten dollars in trade to be paid
when my Baker's Creek tract of land is sold.
Ninthly I bequeath to my son James ten dollars to be dis-
charged in good trade when my Baker's Creek tract of land
is sold. Tenthly I bequeath to my son William that part
of his tract of land on which he now resides running the
course of the creek to Kilpatrick and from the bridge
on the creek to the foot of the mountain where said
piece or division of land is to be laid off before the end
of this tract on which I now dwell be divided as above de-
scribed. Eleventhly I bequeath to my son George a little brown
horse called Jaws. Twelfthly I bequeath to my son John
ten dollars in trade to be paid when the Baker's Creek tract
of land is sold and Elly is to be maintained by this end
of the plantation until she become of age or otherwise her way
of living I likewise ordain and appoint Andrew Kennedy Ch-
arles Kilpatrick and my son John Malcolm to be the Exe-
cutors of this my last will and testament in testimony of
which I have subscribed my hand and seal this Twelfth
day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight

sick and weak in body but of sound mind and age posing
memory for which I thank God and calling to mind the uncertain-
ty of human life and being desirous to dispose of all such
worldly substance substance as is hath pleased God to give
me with I give and bequeath the same in manner following that
is to say - First I desire that all my personal property be imme-
diately sold after my decease except so much as may be necessary
+ regard as the doing of my widow - and out of the moneys arising
therefrom all my debts and funeral expenses be paid and the
remainder of said moneys if any be appropriated to pay moneys
of installments upon my land and if my decease should
take place between the first day of May and the first day of
January that we think of the crop and one third of the part
if fastened be sold - 2nd of give and bequeath to my beloved
wife with the plantation on which I now live during her natu-
ral life or widowhood I also give and bequeath to her
my bed and bedding cupboard and furniture all the house-
hold and kitchen furniture which she brought with her
upon our marriage & that she has made since and all my
farming utensils also all the cattle and moneys that she
brought with her also all my sheep and half of my hogs
I also give and bequeath her a black horse called Jolly, a
cow mare called Darcus and a sorrel filly between two and
three years old - 3rd of give and bequeath to my son
John Woodward five dollars - 4th of give and bequeath
to daughter Mary Gates five dollars - 5th of give and
bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Russell ten dollars
6th of give and bequeath to my son George Woodward twenty
dollars and Mistle's notes in the new Testament
7th of give and bequeath to my son Nicholas Woodward twenty
dollars and my wearing clothes 8th of give and bequeath to
Charles Woodward five dollars and my large Bible
9th of give and bequeath to my daughter Reematha Perry
twenty dollars - 10th of give and bequeath to my son Car-
lie Woodward five dollars - 11th of give and bequeath
to my daughter Providence Mitchell fifty dollars
12th of give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah Mitchell
fifty dollars - 13th of give and bequeath to Thomas W. W.
Woodward forty five dollars and Woods Dictionary of the Bible
14th I will that the above legacies be paid out of the sale
of my land and the remainder be equally divided among
my children Lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint my
friends William Mallen junr and John Cox Executors of this
my last will and testament. In witness whereof I
have hereunto set my hand and seal this 24th day
of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight
hundred and twenty six John Woodward
