John P. Montgomery in yeerling Colt a mare I gave and bequeath to my daughter Peggy P. Montgomery Seventy five acres of land being the residue of my aforesaid plantation including all the buildings and black land mentioned left out in my will to my John P. Montgomery I also give and bequeath to my said daughter the two negroes and one horse both two years old two cows and one heifer three sheep and all my stocks of hogs I also give to my said daughter all my farming utensils except my horse which I give my son John P. Montgomery I also bequeath my said daughter all my household furniture except so much as my wife Mary Montgomery claims which is to be at her die so that I also give my said daughter my lawn and truckings I also give my said daughter one third part of a way on which I have with my sons William and John of the aforesaid property bequeathed to my said daughter Peggy P. Montgomery she is bound to pay all my just debts pay all unpaid of sums of my self and her mother and give her mother a comfortable subsistence during her natural life I also give and bequeath to my son David George William and General Montgomery one dollar each to be paid in property out of the property left to my daughter Peggy P. Montgomery I also give and bequeath to the lawful heirs of my daughter Susan Plishe Dead one dollar in property I appoint and constitute my son John P. and Peggy P. jointly and my executors of this my last will and testament witness my hand and seal 13th April 1827

McClure in name of God Amen I Richard McClure of the County of Blount and State of Tennessee being sick and weak of body but of sound mind and disposing memory for which I thank God and calling to mind the uncertainty of earthly life and being desirous to dispose of all such worldly substance as it hath pleased God to bestow on me with a good and conscience I do hereby bequeath the same in manner following that is to say I desire that all my just debts be paid out of my estate 2^d I give and bequeath to my loving wife one negro girl named Hester during her natural life or widowhood 3^d I give unto my children David John and Hannah five shillings each to be paid out of my estate 4th I give and bequeath to my daughter Patsy an equal portion with the rest of my daughters to be paid out of my estate as aforesaid with my executors the two horses and blacksmith tools and my part due the landyard to be valued three and Hester and her portion are to be equally divided among my children Polly Kallert Elizabeth Kibsekub and Patsy at the death of my wife Elizabeth my hands to be equally divided between my two boys Michael and Joseph the land divided as follows beginning above the fair yard spring thence running to the shop from thence so as to divide it equal man then thence across the property to remain on the place

for the use of it the place be it understood that John Kim Kups possession when he now lives for the space of nine years provided he keep up the fence on the halves and lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint my friends Joseph McRay and Elizabeth McRay my wife Executors of this my last will and testament hereby working all other former wills or testaments by me heretofore made in witness whereof I have here set my hand and seal this fifth April 1827

In the name of God Amen I Joseph McFadden of Blount County, And State of Tennessee being weak of body but of sound mind and memory thank God and calling to mind the uncertainty of my body and knowing that it is once appointed for all men to die as constituted make and ordain this my last will and testament as follows and first of all recommend my soul into the hands of almighty God that give it and my body to the earth to be buried in a decent Christian burial at the discretion of my executors nothing doubting but I shall receive the same again at the General Resurrection by the mighty Power of God and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life I do dispose of the same in the following manner and form My first I give to my daughter Polly Burns one dollar I give to my son David S. McFadden my plantation known by the name of the Long levy and one saddle I give to my daughter Nancy McFadden one barrel I give to my daughter Mary McFadden twelve dollars in trade to be paid out of my property I give to my son Andrew McFadden one rifle and if the same should be disposed of before he comes of age he is to be paid twelve dollars in trade out of my property and after all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid I give and bequeath to my wife Elender McFadden the balance of all my estate both real and personal during her natural life and at her death I desire that the balance of the property what is left to be equally divided between my children namely David S. McFadden Nancy McFadden Mary McFadden and Andrew McFadden and I do hereby constitute and appoint my wife Elender McFadden and my son David S. McFadden my sole executors and Executors of this my last will and testament and I do hereby revoke and disannul all and every other will and testament by me heretofore made and do confirm this and no other to be my last will and testament in witness whereof I the said Joseph McFadden have hereunto set my hand and seal this twenty seventh day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty eight.
