Ann E. Mullendorf's Will.

1st I give and bequeath to my two daughters D. Annie C. Mullendorf and Mat Ella Mullendorf my farm lying in the 12th Civil District of Blount County Tennessee to be theirs as long as they remain single at their death or marriage my will is that it shall be equally divided between my two sons William W. and Revel L. Mullendorf.

2nd It is my will and desire that as long as any two daughters remain single that all my unmarried children shall enjoy the proceeds and profits of said farm in common.

3rd It is my will and desire that, if on due Consideration by all parties mentioned in the above provisions and by my executors, it is thought best, to sell the farm and convert the money in real estate somewhere else. This has been my intention for some time past believing that it would be to the best interest of my family to sell and re-invest the money in another locality.

4th I give and bequeath to the Baptist Church one half acre of land on which to build a house of worship, said lot is located as follows - Beginning on the corner of J. L. McCamy's lot on which his residence stands and running with his line and with the public road one hundred feet and then up the hill far enough to enclose one half acre in the boundary. If this lot is not utilized for this purpose in ten years my desire is that it shall be sold and the money appropriated to the Home and Foreign Missions of the Baptist Church.

5th I will and desire that my undivided interest in some mountain land owned by my father J. W. Foundle be sold and inherited by one from his estate be sold and the money derived from the same be equally divided among my five daughters and my two sons, viz Mary B. Taylor, Hattie C. French, Ida W. McCamy, D. Annie C. Mullendorf, Mat Ella Mullendorf, William W. and Revel L. Mullendorf.

6th I hereby appoint my husband C. L. Mullendorf, executor of this my last will and testament and I will and desire that he shall see that its provisions and details are carried out.

Ross at Sister Polly's death to sell any land or rent it till he thinks he can sell it to the best advantage and the money for the land I give and bequeath to my Grand daughter Hula Ross the sum Rev. W. Ross to be paid out of same for his trouble my \$200 check I give and bequeath to the said Hula Ross after burying expenses is paid and doctor bill and my Cow to be sold to Tempie Garner for \$15. if she wants her my hogs chicken sorghum turkeys and corn chum and all my buckets crocks and jars I want sold and the money for the same I give to Hula Ross but the table sofa and meal chest are not to be sold till after Polly's death the money to go to Hula Ross.

I give and bequeath to Hattie Miller my bedstead that is down stairs my clock and glass lamp a gown and Shamus brass kettle, table window shades, carving knife and fork I give and bequeath to Grand Ma Roach girls 2 dresses Black banton and black Cashmere and all the cuffs and dolman cloak and big winter shawl and 2 Cotton Comforter one is blue checked and the other is filled down with blue any shore hats and bonnet my black pattern dress and my chesterfield gingham and my silk waist.

I bequeath to Nettie Ross my bed and pillows and my picture. I give and bequeath to Emma Roach my gold spectacles.

I give to Margaret McInturff 1 Shuisse trimmed in hemburg trimming and a braided gown.

I give to Tempie Garner Margaret McInturff Hattie Miller

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and Brownlow left my dishes but I want sister Polly Lulloch to have all my Cupboard and Kitchen furniture she needs her lifetime and then disposed of as herein mentioned.

I give and bequeath to Brownlow Bell a Strawberries three pillows three Comforter 2 Wallen ones and a Calico one, dog iron, and one 4 chair at Sister Polly Lulloch death 2 quilt one good one one that is worn and to his wife Lucy Bell I give all my old skirt and my Water proof cap and all the old sheet

I give and bequeath to Temple Garner a Hamburg Skimme and a Undershirt she can find them at herself.

I give and bequeath all the rest residue and remainder of my personal property of every name and nature or kind to my aforesaid Grand daughter Julia Ross including 2 silk skirts a black and white one and a black and white chekered one and 2 cashmere dresses 2 trunks and all that is in them except my dolman and big shawl and dolman cloak the big Spoons and ten little Spoons my basket must be sold and the money goes to Julia Ross all that is or that I have given to Julia Ross is to her and her heirs.

I desire to be buried in a white gown and a Hamburg Skimme and a white flannel skirt white stockings and no gloves and I want Miss Huffstutter to make my coffin.

I hereby appoint George W. Ross sole Executor of this will.

I, J. G. C. Clark, of Blount County, Tenn. being of sound mind and disposing memory, do make, publish and declare this to be my last will and testament, hereby revoking and making void all former wills by one at any time made,

1st

I will and bequeath that all of my just debts and funeral expenses be paid by my Executor as soon after my death as practicable.

I will and bequeath to my wife, Elizabeth Clark, during her life or during her widowhood the period she may remain my widow, all my household and Kitchen furniture and all the live stock that I may own at any death, to wit; horses, mules, cattle, sheep, hogs &c. and also my Farming implements, including wagons, buggies, harnesses &c; in short, including everything on the home place pertaining to the Farms. In the event that on the death of my wife there shall be any property designated in this paragraph remaining, the same is to be sold by my Executor and distributed among her nearest of kin.

3.

I give and bequeath my five shares of Bank Stock in the Derrick Bank, amounting to five thousand dollars to the following persons as follows: To my sister Lydia Delozier a one seventh interest; to my brother W. B. Clark, a one seventh interest; to my brother Ben Clark a one seventh interest; to my sister Lucretia McMurry a one seventh interest; to the children of my deceased brother Rev. Clark a one seventh interest; to the children of my deceased sister Nancy Johnson a one seventh interest, and to James Evans and Martha Evans, children of my deceased sister Hannah Evans, a one seventh interest. But my Executor is required to retain said said five shares of bank stock in said bank during the natural life or widowhood of my said wife Elizabeth Clark and he shall pay to her the proceeds or dividends of said stock semi-annually during her said natural life or widowhood.
