Other people to the amount of Twenty Pounds current Money  
of North Carolina - My will and Desire is that the same shall  
be Justly paid by the sale of my slaves in Caswell County <sup>to</sup> two or three  
two in the hands of Thomas Rice one with Charles Taylor and one  
in the hands of Adam Dixon except the debt due to Abolom  
Tatton which I wish to be paid out of the collection of a Debt  
due me from this State of upwards of three hundred Pounds  
for Soldiers service in the continental Army and a Debt  
Due me from John Taylor and a Debt due me from the  
estate of John Latrell Do<sup>d</sup> and After all my just Debts  
paid my Desire is that the tract of Land called the Chick-  
asas Bluff belong to Eliza Rice because he is willing to  
go to the Western Country and that each of my Brothers have  
their first choice of five Thousand Acres of my Remaining  
Lands as in Rotation and After the Lands is Surveyed by  
Col<sup>t</sup> Pitt Captain Lewis or their Deputies which I am  
bound to attend the Surveying of the other grants as often  
and for the same as agreeable to Bonds now or before of  
Thomas Rice. My will is that all of my Sisters have five Thousand Acres  
each and After that is divided out further My Will is that If  
Roxton have his next choice of six Thousand Acres either in Tracts  
of three Thousand Acres or the whole as near together as may be

Land be appropriated to the use of Schooling the Poor at Cumber-  
land to be entitled to the best Advantage by a Commissioner  
who may be Appointed by the General Assembly where the

State of Kentucky, Logan County, State

A Court held for judgment on the 19<sup>th</sup> day of November in the year  
of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and four. On the Motion of our  
Ex't. for the manumission of the Negro man named George the property of  
the said George Boston. Do now make this the 2<sup>d</sup> Article of the  
Law of this State in such case made and provided. It is therefore  
Ordered that the said Negro man George be manumitted forthat  
Liberty

I further order that the said Boston is then except from  
the laws of the said court. I remanded him back to his master and his  
servants. Let my hands be bound that he will not be offend  
on the Twenty fourth day of November 1806 and 13<sup>th</sup> year of the common  
wealth.
